Pastoral Letter

Summer 2015

Dear Friends,

Over the past year many people have been hesitant to talk too much about Scotland. This hesitancy arose out of a fear they may be revealing a political inclination. Others could talk about little else. How you voted in the referendum is your business – I hope you did vote!

Perhaps now with a little distance and the calming of spirits we can again speak naturally about Scotland and all that it means to us. The summer, I hope, will soon be upon us. There will be opportunities to sit, walk or play in the sunshine. Everything seems to look a little better in the sun. You may take time to travel in Scotland and enjoy some of the wonderful scenery on our doorstep or just a little further.

On a recent visit to Oban we took some time to visit the Isle of Seil. In order to get to the Isle of Seil you can cross the Atlantic Bridge. It is also known as the Clachan Bridge. It is a simple, single-arched, humped back bridge spanning the Clachan Sound, 13 kilometres (8.1 miles) southwest of Oban. The bridge links the west coast

of the Scottish mainland with the Island of Seil. Originally designed by Thomas Telford, and built between 1792 and 1793 by engineer Robert Milne, the bridge became known as "The Bridge over the Atlantic". It was designed with a high arch, of roughly 22 metres (72 ft) span and about 12 metres (39 ft) above the bed of the channel, to allow the passage of vessels at high tide. The story is told that it was at this bridge, when the Kilt was banned in Scotland that people would change into trousers before stepping on the mainland of Scotland. However it must only be a story. The act banning kilts came into effect as part of the Dress act of 1746. This was repealed in 1782. The bridge was not built until 1792/93. However, the story may still have an element of truth since there is a little Bothie nearby that would be perfect for changing.

When you visit such sites you are more aware of the turbulent past in Scotland and the tension of being a nation with customs and principles. During the summer people will often visit Church sites. They will stand outside and photograph or go in and pray, looking at the windows the furnishings and anything else of beauty. They may get caught up in the story of the people, the place and the faith the building represents. It is my hope this year as the summer comes and goes we will find opportunity to sit in our own church, visit other churches or places of significance to our faith, from Iona to the Martyrs Monument in St Andrews. This is our heritage this is our story – this is our faith.

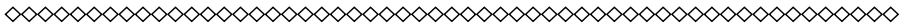

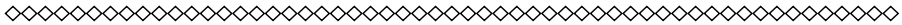

Swifts Project 2014/15

In recent years there has been an alarming reduction in the number of swifts that visit us from Africa each summer to the extent that they are now an endangered species. Our project was aimed at encouraging more of these fascinating birds to nest in the Kirkintilloch area and to involve the community in our efforts. With the Rangers from Mugdock Country Park as partners and with the support of Swift Conservation Scotland we made a start in the spring of 2014.

Having approached Kirkintilloch High School, we were delighted when a group of third year students led by Claire Kirker, Principal Teacher Design and Technology, volunteered to help and produced four beautifully made nesting boxes from a design supplied by SCS. Unfortunately, we were unable to find sites for the boxes in time for the 2014 nesting season. In November eight more were produced during a community event when members of the public took part in a construction session organised by Mugdock Rangers in St Mary's Church car park. In April 2015 nine boxes were erected on the walls of the Church Hall in plenty of time for this year's arrivals. Our sincere thanks go to East Dunbartonshire Council and the Fabric Committee for their assistance in putting them in place.

The swifts arrive from Africa each year around mid-May and in June 2014 the Mugdock Rangers led a community "swift spotting" walk through Kirkintilloch and along the Forth and Clyde Canal during which a number were seen flying high above the town. Another walk took place a month later when the sharp-eyed among us were again able to watch the swifts' aerobatic displays. Sadly, they left us in August to return to Africa.

In order to spread the word about our project the nesting boxes were used in educational talks to nursery children, some featured in floral displays at the Centenary Flower Festival, they were on view at the ECO Church Service and they were the subject of an article in the Kirkintilloch Herald. The project was financed by a grant from CSV Action Earth for which we are

grateful and we are greatly indebted to our friends the Mugdock Rangers who applied for the grant on our behalf and who have been an enormous help throughout.

Now that this year's breeding season is under way we hope and pray that some swifts will use our nesting boxes thus helping to reverse the serious decline in their numbers.

Session Report

In regard to the proposed work on the Church roof, I previously reported on the progress of our grant application with the Heritage Lottery Fund. Unfortunately, during the assessment phase of our Stage I application, it became apparent that we were not going to be successful at this time. It is going to be necessary to undertake additional structural surveys to demonstrate that our project will meet the required criteria of the grant fund. We therefore took the decision to withdraw our application, to give us the opportunity to provide the necessary reports, before resubmitting our application later in the year.

At the time of going to print, we will be preparing to vote on the Draft basis of Parish Grouping for the four Church of Scotland congregations in Kirkintilloch. If the congregations all vote in favour then the proposal will be taken to Glasgow Presbytery later in June, for the grouping to be ratified.

During the month of May, we had the opportunity to vote for the charities we would like to support during the next three years. Thanks to everyone who participated in this exercise – the outcome of the selection process is noted below:

2015/16 – Marie Curie and CHAS Rachel House, Balloch

2016/17 – Parkinsons UK and WaterAid

2017/18 – Seagull Trust (Kirkintilloch) and Guide Dogs

At the end of May, we also had the opportunity for the Nursery School to participate in our Sunday Worship. It was great to see so many children, parents, carers and staff from the nursery and to recognise the fantastic work they have been doing at St Mary's for the past 50 years. Our thanks go out to everyone involved.

Our next Session Meeting is on Wednesday 10th June. This is the last meeting before the summer recess and once again it is proposed to make this an open evening. The meeting will take place in the Church Halls at 7:30pm and members of the congregation and our organisations are all encouraged to attend.

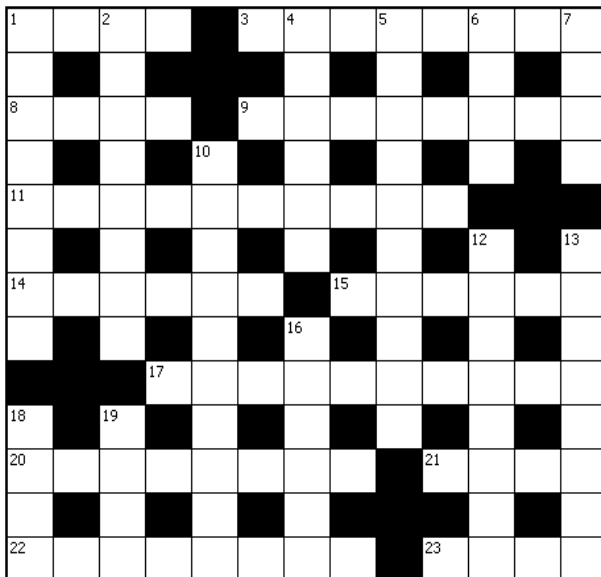
