Pastoral Letter

June 2012

Dear Friends,

'Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.' (2 Corinthians 5:17)

Over the long weekend of the Queen's Jubilee we were around the house more than usual. We decided it would be a good opportunity to do some 'Spring-Cleaning'. Having lived in the Manse for a few years we have accumulated quiet a lot of 'stuff'. In the loft I had two dining tables and twelve dining chairs. I had kept them, thinking, 'you never know when you will need another dining table!' In the loft there was Ice Hockey equipment which was clearly too small for our children. In the recesses of the loft there were clothes, shoes, hats and winter coats that were all too small. Sorting through the various spaces in the loft, cupboards and drawers we found things we had lost and recognised those things that were no longer of any use to us.

This week our hallway has been filled with bags for the Charity shop, recycling, friends, and the bin.

As the week went on we discovered we had too much rubbish for our 'wheelie bin'. This rubbish consisted of

things that were broken or of no use to anyone. In an endeavour to follow through with our original intention to have a 'Spring-Clean' I hired a van to take our rubbish to Mavis Valley rubbish dump. I was delighted to fill the van and throw away the things that were no longer of any value. This 'stuff' had been clogging up the house. Practically a 'Spring-clean' can be desirable and sometimes necessary. Theologically we have to get rid of the rubbish in our life!


When you read the Old Testament there is a symbolic action people adopt. It is the custom for people to lay their hands on a goat and then send it out into the wilderness. The bible says; "He is to lay both hands on the head of the live goat and confess over it all the wickedness and rebellion of the Israelites - all their sins - and put them on the goats head. He shall send the goat away into the desert in the care of a man appointed for the task" (Lev 16:21,22). In the new testament at John 1:29 you read these words 'The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said; 'Look, the lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world'. This alludes to the Jewish Passover when a lamb's blood was daubed on the door lintel to save the people. Death did not come to the house if the blood was on the door. This meant the lamb had saved the people. In the new testament we are told Jesus saves the people. Crudely stated, Jesus deals with the rubbish. This is more than a 'spring clean', it goes to the very core of our being. The cleansing Jesus offers restores our soul.

Thinking of the relief there is in going to the rubbish dump, how much more relief is there in digging deep into our hearts, confessing our sin and knowing the forgiveness that Jesus can bring. This is a clearing of the deck, a fresh start, a new beginning!

What rubbish is holding you back from spiritual growth, what broken places need restored?

This is the essence of the passage from 2 Corinthians – 'Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come'.

David Gray

29th January 1838 – 3rd December 1861

Our local poet was born of humble cotton weavers in Duntiblae, Waterside and was the eldest of 8 children. His appreciation of natural beauty was kindled when, as a youth, he would watch the rivers Luggie and Bothlyn as they flowed past his home.

David was a clever lad and due to his parents sacrificial effort attended the University of Glasgow. Their intention was for him to be a Minister of the Kirk, but David had set his mind on a literary career and with the exuberance of youth and learning, that can bring impetuosity, he, with his university friend Robert Buchanan, decided fame and fortune awaited them in London. David's embryo literary talent had not gone unnoticed and while at university, his poem 'The Luggie' received favourable comments from people of influence. On arrival in London, he missed his friend at the station and not knowing where the lodgings were, slept in Hyde Park. From this consequence a cold was caught that wouldn't lift, his health deteriorated and soon followed the diagnoses of consumption. David returned to Merkland and his devoted family's care. He was visited by his benefactors, who, knowing his longing to see his work in print, endeavoured to find a publisher for his verse. David was said to be diffident and humble in manner reverent in mind and conscious of many failings.

Sonnets 'In the Shadows', written in the last months of his life, along with his poem 'The Luggie' aspire to give the reader insight, of the wonders to be seen, if we just watch for a while, God's beautiful, natural world. The published print of his poem 'The Luggie' was placed in his hand on 02 December 1861 and he died the following day. His few last words were 'God has love and I have faith'.

David Gray's Monument, erected in 1865, stands over his grave, just beyond the entrance to the Auld Aisle Burial Ground.

A Golden Wedding poem by David Gray

1. O Love, whose patient pilgrim feet
Life's longest path have trod
Whose ministry hath symbolled sweet
the dearer love of God -
the sacred myrtle wreathes again,
thine altar, as of old;
and what was green with summer, then,
is mellowed now, to gold.
2. Not now, as then, the Future's face
Is flushed with fancy's light
But memory, with a milder grace,
Shall rule the feast, tonight
blest was the sun of joy that shone,
nor less the blinding shower -
the bud of fifty years ago
Is love's perfected flower!
3. O memory, open thy mystic door;
O dream of youth, return;
And let the lights that gleamed of yore
Beside the altar burn!
The past is plain, 'twas love designed
e'en sorrow's iron chain,
and mercy's shining thread has twined
with the dark warp of pain.
4. So be it, still. O Thou who hast,
That younger bridal blest,
till the May - morn of love has passed
to evening's golden west -
come to this later Cana, Lord,
and, at thy touch divine,
the water of that earlier board
Tonight shall turn to wine.

Session Report

Our meeting in May included a presentation from our Treasurer John Thomson on the church accounts. In these challenging economic times the level of voluntary giving by the congregation stands up well in comparison with previous years. However with rising costs and a substantial contribution to the central funds, we still find ourselves in deficit.

We, like the majority of Churches in the Church of Scotland have to wrestle with on the one hand, ensuring St Marys remains financially viable as a congregation on its own and on the other paying our fair share to the central fund. We are one of the wealthier congregations in the Church of Scotland and if we subscribe to the belief that the Church of Scotland should maintain a presence in every parish in Scotland then we have to pay more by way of a contribution to the Church centrally. When we see that contribution eating into our reserves then naturally we feel nervous for the future of St Mary's. Accordingly, the Session has asked me to write to the Church of Scotland to express our concern in this respect.

Similarly as I mentioned in my article last month, we are presently involved in the process of Glasgow Presbytery reviewing how the various churches operate in the Glasgow area and whether there is a need to have 4 ministers in the 4 churches in Kirkintilloch. This is the Presbytery Plan. Again we feel anxious that our present arrangements as a result of this review may change. If we recognise however our duty as Christians to spread the Good News then we have to recognise that difficult decisions sometimes have to be made in order to achieve this. We await advice on how the Plan will be moved forward and again Session have asked me to write to Glasgow Presbytery to encourage some decision here as we remain in limbo at the moment and that is not in the interests of the church, both this one and the Church nationally.

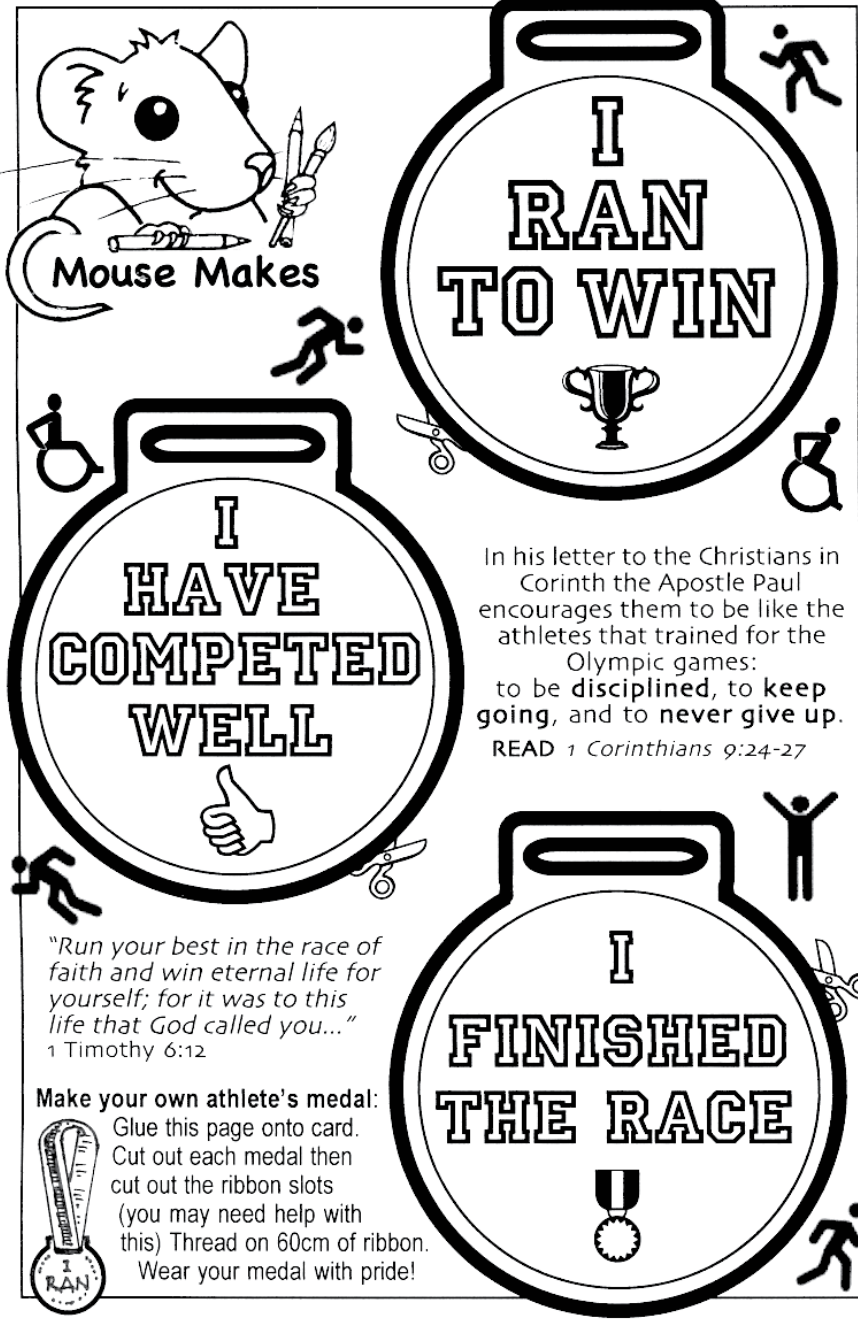

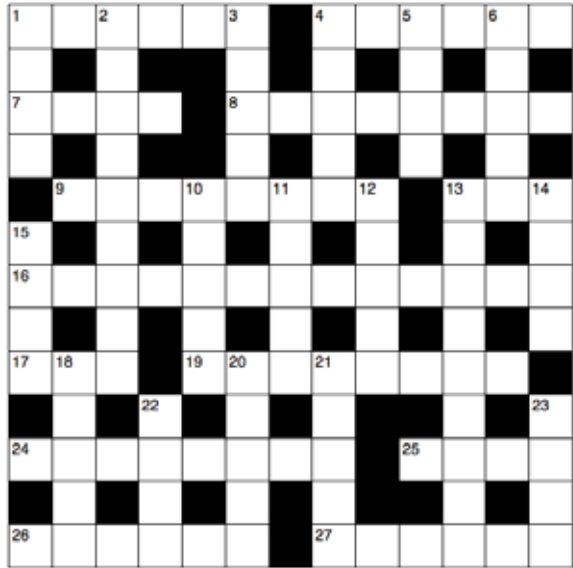

St. IGNATIUS of LOYOLA: 31st July

The youngest of 13 children, Ignatius Loyola was born in Spain. When a young soldier he was badly wounded by a cannon ball that shattered his leg. As he recovered he asked for a best selling book of the day, a romance, to read to take his mind off the pain but ended up reading about Jesus and the lives of the saints. His life changed as he resolved to continue being a soldier, but now as a soldier for Christ.

In 1534, at the age of 43, he and 6 others offered themselves to the service of the Catholic Church. They became the Society of Jesus and Ignatius was elected to serve as their first general. When other Jesuits were sent on various missions by the pope, Ignatius stayed in Rome founding homes for orphans and colleges all, in the words of the Jesuit motto, 'ad majorem Dei gloriam' - for the greater glory of God.
