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Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

Over the past month we have moved the Vestry in the Church from its original place to the back of the Session House. This seemed to be a simple task.

Sunday after Church to move the necessary furniture and equipment. It seemed all to be settled. However, it has taken the best part of a month to move properly. Electrical sockets were connected, a partition erected, the wifi re-located the room painted and all in all a lot of work was done by many. The lion's share of the work fell to our property convener. With a band of helpers he made the move possible. The need to move arose from a financial saving in allowing the contractors, doing the work on our roof, to

use the vestry, toilet and ladies room. This removed the need for Portakabin facilities and saved the Church a considerable sum – even after the relocation of the vestry.

It has been an interesting time moving. It seemed simple but took the work of many. When I was reading the Bible passage about the Hebrew people leaving Egypt. (If you remember they had gone to Egypt willingly and then been held captive and enslaved).

The Hebrew people made a tremendous effort and it took the courage, vision and work of many to make the move.

Too often we try to do things on our own. This can be the result of feeling isolated with few folks around. However sometimes our individual striving is about an unnecessary independence. We may benefit from taking time to secure help and support when we make a change. We need not

make the move on our own.

Jesus was someone who was often on the move. He would look for help with accommodation, food and provisions and even places to meet, greet and eat. He saw the strength of involving others.

One of the most tragic moments in the Jesus story is when he is abandoned by everyone and hangs on the cross reciting the Psalm '*Why have you forsaken me?*'

We know at this time of year, after Easter, he was not abandoned. God was always with him even when he seemed most alone.

I am grateful for all the work people do around the church and know that we could never do it on our own.



Christian Aid Week

14th - 20th May, 2017



This year marks the 70th anniversary of the founding of Christian Aid and 60 years of Christian Aid week. The organisation was founded in response to the refugee crisis in Europe which developed after the end of the Second World War. Christian Aid has been helping refugees ever since and is their main emphasis this year. Today there are 65 million refugees across the globe, fleeing their homes because of war, conflict and disaster and making dangerous journeys in search of safety.

- They currently work in 39 countries with 576 local partner organisations

March General Account Expenditure

As can be seen in the detail of offering and General Account Expenditure, our receipts, outwith receipts to The Special Projects Fund, amount to £7,997.50 against expenditure of £14,793.87. It is worthy of note that there are 3 items of expenditure which in total amount to £3,201.91, these being the cost of offering envelopes and record books for the year, Church of Scotland Presbytery Dues 1sst of 2 instalments for the year and cost of Life & Work for the year, for those members who receive this and reimburse the Church for the cost of this. Even taking this into account, you can see that there is still a significant deficit for the month.

The Rectory . . .

St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

Your new thermostatically controlled, underwater illuminated baptismal tank with wave simulation, for total immersions, sounds rather intimidating. I am slightly surprised you don't have computer-generated doves flying overhead, in order to add that final touch of authenticity. I would imagine that to perform baptisms in your tank, you need a degree in electrical engineering as much as one in theology.

I do, however, agree with your Vicar's decision to stop the practice of you performing these rituals in the river Mersey. It is one thing for your newly baptised to emerge from the waters filled with the Holy Spirit, and quite another to emerge filled with typhoid. Better to give them a baptismal certificate, rather than a free ride to the hospital for a stomach pump. The river Jordan may have been all very well for John the Baptist, but I expect that even he would hesitate at the river Mersey.

Had I baptised dear Miss Pemberton in the Mersey last month – at 93 years, taking the decision a little late in life (I did not attempt to hold her in one arm) – being a lady of such proportions, I suspect she would have constituted a shipping hazard.




