# *Pastoral Letter*

June 2014

## Dear Friends,

Matthew 7:5 ‘...first take the log out of your own eye before you attempt to take the log out of your neighbours’

Will you get away on holiday this summer? Maybe a holiday is just what you need! I know some folk prefer to stay locally or travel within Scotland or England. The variety of places we get to makes for interesting conversation upon our return home. Holidays can offer an opportunity to experience a larger world than the everyday. I am aware that for some a holiday is not possible, responsibilities at home or increasing years and infirmity make travel impossible.

When folks are on holiday they often take an opportunity to recreate themselves or experiment with how they look. They wear things they would never dream of wearing on Cowgate in Kirkintilloch, they perhaps eat out more, socialise more and try new things, cycling, hill climbing,

paragliding, sand surfing, water surfing or a ride on the Banana Boat. I am sure the list could be as varied as the people reading this letter. When on holiday we may find it easier to 'Park' the concerns that niggle at home. We may come back feeling fresher and ready to face the challenges that come our way every day. No matter where we go, what we do, it is often what is within us that makes the difference. Oliver Wendell Holmes wrote '**What lies behind and what lies before us are tiny matters compared to what lies within us**'. Jon Kabat-Zinn wrote a book entitled 'Wherever you go there you are'. Both these writers pick up on the teaching we find in the Bible. True benefit in life comes not from what new experiences we may have or what we wear or where we travel to but by knowing ourselves and understanding ourselves. The Apostle Paul says '**Examine yourself to see whether you are in the faith; test yourself. Do you not realise that Christ Jesus is in you**'

Thomas Merton, a Christian writer, said; '**We must cast off our false, exterior self, like a cheap and showy garment that it is. We must find our real self...in its very great and very simple dignity: created to be a child of God, and capable of loving with something of God's own sincerity**'.

So wherever you get to this summer remember the 'interior work' of getting to know who you really are is as important as the beautiful sunset you may experience or the new people you may meet. If you stay at home because of responsibilities you too can take time to better understand who you really are. What did Greeks say? -- 'Know thyself'.

As Matthew 7:5 suggests, only when we understand our own faults, failings and shortcomings are we enabled to help others.

# Session Meeting

There has been two Session meetings since the last Parishioner. An extra meeting was held on 30th April for two specific purposes. Namely to approve our accounts and secondly to consider a proposal to extend the paving that will flow from Barleybank through the gap in our wall to the church steps. As originally proposed, the paving would only come to the line of the verge and not across the driveway. Whilst this might have looked aesthetically pleasing, the concern from Session was that with heavy traffic passing across this area there was a chance of damage if matters were not dealt with correctly and that damage could be difficult to fix. Session's view was to go with the original proposal so the paving comes to the edge of the verge.

At our regular meeting on 14th May, in addition to the usual reports, we discussed the plans for our centenary service on 14th September and refreshments afterwards. We are conscious that the service and refreshments afterwards will be well attended. The plan is to have a two course meal after the service which will be professionally catered for at the cost of £10 per head. Tickets price £1 will be available to allow you to reserve a place and the hope is donations on the day will cover the cost. We will intimate in good time when the tickets are available.

We also hope to have something organised to help celebrate the Queen's baton passing through Kirkintilloch as part of the Commonwealth Relay on 19th July. The Commonwealth Games will be the biggest sporting event to hit Glasgow for years and with it will be an upsurge in community spirit. It is an opportunity for us to do "mission", to open the doors and welcome folks into St Mary's. The other churches in the community are looking at things that can be done during the fortnight of the games so we will let you know of other events as they happen. If you would like to be involved in this then we would be pleased to hear from you.

Finally, as I stand down on 11th June, can I thank everyone on the Kirk Session who has shown me support and help over the past 10 years. In particular I would like to thank Mark for his generosity of spirit and to my successor Gordon for his friendship. I wish Gordon the very best for the future. I would also like to thank Lynn for her patience and love. I was honoured to have served St Mary's congregation as Session Clerk just as my father had done, even if I could not quite match his 27 years! Thank you.

## Hymns help reduce anxiety

Listening to hymns can make older people less anxious about death, according to a recent study. Listening to religious music can also increase life satisfaction, self-esteem and a sense of control over your life. Gospel music, in particular, has a powerful ability to decrease anxiety about death. The study, published online in *The Gerontologist*, found that “religion has been linked with desirable mental health outcomes among older adults. This study shows that listening to religious music may promote psychological well-being in later life.”

# The Rectory . . .

Your remark that you rather liked the silence we keep before starting Services gave me pause for thought. I suppose all things are relative. I know that the noise your congregation makes before worship resembles a packed stand on the football terraces any Saturday afternoon, but the days seem long-gone when I could expect our congregation to sit in real silence for ten minutes.

There's the sound of the treasurer counting the previous day's jumble sale takings, of the ladies at the back asking each other when the fish van will next come round, and of Major Hastings's deafening whisper as he comments some women's choice of hats. Add to this the weekly competition between the organist and the bell ringers to see who can make the most noise, the roar from the choir vestry as they all complain they don't like my choice of hymns and the sound of books, umbrellas and collection money being dropped. I sometimes suspect that an informal rota is arranged whereby people volunteer to drop heavy objects in rotation, thus maintaining a constant clatter, for which

no single person can be held responsible.

There is also the weekly ritual when the verger – always waiting until the church is full – goes round each microphone, giving them a bash and bellowing "Testing, testing" and relishing the echo as it bounces off the walls.

The only time the noise level drops significantly is if the congregation see Miss Simpson sidle up to me to have one of her confidential little chats about someone in the village. Everyone knows that her information will provide more than enough to keep gossip flourishing for the following week.

Equally, periods of silence during Services are rarely welcomed; some find them threatening, but the majority simply assume it means I have lost my place. I gave up after one occasion when, on announcing we would say the Lord's Prayer and then leaving a time of silence for recollection, a chairman leaned over to me and whispered helpfully: "It begins 'Our Father' . . ."


