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# *Pastoral Letter*

March 2014

Dear Friends,

**'Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ' (Gal 6:2)**

How easy is it to help others? Sometimes our help can be rejected. Sometimes we may mis-read a situation and the struggle another is facing is an important growing opportunity. There are, however, some situations where we need to draw near to another and share the difficult situation they are in.

In Church we get the opportunity to share with people in their joy. The birth of a child, the marriage of a family member and the pattern of the high points of life give the Church the opportunity to share with people in the colourful moments of living. A further privilege for the Church and the people of the Church is to share in the more difficult parts of life. We are often with people when they are troubled in their heart, mind, family,

or when they are ill. We are often invited into family homes at times of bereavement. The words of scripture, prayer and the presence of another may be a comfort and bring consolation at a difficult time.

One question I wrestle with is 'Who advocates on behalf of the bereaved?' At that most difficult of times we often need people around us to support and direct us. We don't always see things straight and we are disorientated. It was with some upset I read the headlines in the Kirkintilloch Herald this week. The headline suggests East Dunbartonshire Council will increase the cost to be buried in a local cemetery by 50%. This shocks, upsets and distresses. I am again left asking 'Who advocates on behalf of the bereaved?' I have written a few emails of enquiry and will make a freedom of information request in the coming weeks. I want to know why the 50% increase has been introduced. What has brought this about? It is my hope this is not a simple exploitation of the vulnerable, who 'NEED' to buy this service and have no way of avoiding it? The famous saying of Benjamin Franklin is '....in this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes'. There is the feeling that even death is clearly taxed.

My reading of the Bible urges me to 'Bear one another's burden'. This must surely mean in times of loss and confusion too.

Who will you help bear the burden and can you take time to identify who may need you to advocate?

# **St Mary's Junior Badminton Club Championship 2014**

Our junior club championship was held in St Mary's main hall on Saturday 1st February 2014. Forty juniors entered our four singles events which started at 1:00 p.m. and finished at 9:00 p.m. At the end of an exciting day's badminton the club champions and runners up for season 2013-14 are as follows:

The club championship was well supported by our junior players this season, with most of the membership turning out to play. The largest event was the Gents U18 Championship which had sixteen players. The Gents U13 event had fourteen players and the two ladies events, U13 and U18, had six and eight players respectively. These numbers reflect the current club membership and we must say that the juniors supported their club in good numbers

Scott Curran retained his U13 title which he has now won for the third and final time; he will be too old to play U13 next season. He also reached the quarter finals of the U18 championship with some notable scores against older players. Scott is one of the strongest players in the district and we're delighted he's a member of our club. Sophie Shu won the U13 ladies title and despite the low entry there is no doubt that she is a fine player. Sophie played with the Chinese community and Glasgow satellite squad throughout the summer and returned to us in September as a much improved player. Sophie has become one of the club characters and it's great to see her play the game,

and win, with a smile and a laugh. Haihui Yan won the ladies U18 title after being the runner up last season. Haihui is a very strong player and won convincingly against a determined opponent, Lisa Begg. Haihui is very busy with her studies and her violin but she manages to attend on a regular basis and her membership is much appreciated. Scott Millin won his second and final U18 Gents title as he will be too old to play next season. Scott is another busy teenager who includes the Scouts and badminton beside his studies. Scott also plays with the senior club where we're delighted when he finds the time to play with us senior players.

Four players won titles, which means that thirty six didn't. It's the nature of sport that there are fewer winners than losers, but we must thank everyone for playing as it would be a poor tournament without them. Many of our current regular club members did not win junior events and yet they have continued to play and stay fit despite the pressures of continuous employment or full time studies. We must sincerely thank all those who took part and encourage them to keep playing and supporting the club. Badminton needs more participants and we are grateful for them all.

Our championship has become a big event in our year and this is the tenth time we've held it in its current form. Nancy Burns and Elizabeth Barrie work at the event all day and have supported us for many years. From the senior club, Ruth also worked all day and Andrew drew the posters and sold the raffle tickets. Kenny, Stuart, Renz, Jennifer, Stephanie and Craig umpired the games. Great job folks and thanks for all your time and effort.

A badminton competition needs a venue and St Mary's hall is a fine hall for badminton. Many thanks for allowing us to use your hall on a Saturday and for your support throughout the season.

# The Rectory . . .

## St James the Least My dear Nephew Darren

Visits from your parishioners are always welcome. But I did not expect them to return to you complaining because our pews are uncomfortable.

Pews are meant to be uncomfortable. The unshakeable belief of our congregation is that the more uncomfortable the pew, the holier the worship must be. By the same token, an 8am Service is more fervent than one at 11am, since it is much more socially inconvenient. If you add on enduring sub-zero temperatures and damp, then sainthood clearly beckons. Your people may be used to lolling in upholstered chairs in tropical temperatures, but I am sure such comfort places their souls in grave peril.

Our pews were built five hundred years ago when people were several inches shorter and many pounds lighter and so could accommodate themselves on them perfectly adequately. The fact that a twenty-first century body is in constant danger of sliding off the seat and requires knees to be folded somewhere near ears at least helps to keep minds focussed—apart for Colonel Wainwright, who still manages to sleep peacefully throughout Mattins every Sunday.

I could point out that your chairs

make kneeling almost impossible – although I suspect that posture is not encouraged in your church, as people would then be unable to read the words on your overhead projector or wave their arms about quite as easily during the hymns. While the majority of our congregation find the Anglican crouch perfectly adequate, you can see those who flop to their knees on hearing “let us pray” from the clouds of dust sent up from suddenly compressed hassocks, which were purchased to commemorate Queen Victoria’s Accession.

I may also point out that our box pews are very useful for modern times. Once a family is seated, with the door firmly shut, then any toddler is penned in and unable to use the aisles as a racing circuit. Medieval carpenters were clearly forward thinking people. Admittedly, box pew doors do tend to stick and few manage to look dignified while they wait for step ladders to be brought before they can climb out.

If only you would remove your chairs and substitute benches without backs, turn off all heating and replace carpets with slate slabs, I am sure your congregation’s religious zeal would soar.

# Be healed!




