# Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

As you receive this magazine a time of waiting will have passed. We recently celebrated advent. In the Christian year advent is recognised as a time of waiting. We wait for the birth of the Christ child and we celebrate the child's arrival on Christmas. Other branches of the Christian Church celebrate the birth of the Christ child also. Not everyone celebrates Christmas on the 25th of December. For some it is January. The emphasis is on the fact the waiting has ended and the desired for outcome has arrived.

In this article I know we have moved on from Christmas and waiting for Jesus. I have been waiting to preach as Sole Nominee for another congregation. The Church has an interesting system when appointing a new Minister. It finds its origins in abuses of power that were resisted by regular members of the church.

Historically the appointment of a new Minister lay in the hands of male land owners. However, this system was open to abuse and some landowners

impose a Minister who was not approved by the people of the congregation and parish. The landowner in partnership with the Presbytery over-ruled local congregations.

Resisting this imposition of Ministers resulted in a great disruption in the Church of Scotland. The year was 1843 and the schism, or division, within the established Church of Scotland resulted in 450 ministers breaking away from the Church. This was really an issue of the relationship the Church should have with the state. The Church and politics.

Ministers who left the Church gave up their congregation, their home and their means of providing for their family. They left on a point of principle. Thomas Chalmers was the Minister who led the disruption. He was professor of theology and was called 'Scotland's greatest nineteenth-century churchman'.

By 1929 the Church would reunite and the Church of Scotland as we know it today was born. A congregation's freedom to choose their own Minister was established. It would initially be male heads of households who could elect the Minister. In time women would have the opportunity to vote too.

This is why I must preach on the 3rd of February 2019 as Sole Nominee of the other congregation. The congregation are given the opportunity to choose their own Minister. If, when I preach on the

3rd of February, the congregation vote, by a majority, to have me as Minister, the Presbytery must then sustain that election. It is the congregation who choose. The congregation then have the opportunity to sign a Call sheet which expresses their wish to have a certain person as their new Minister.

You can see how this is a waiting time. I have been invited to be Sole Nominee. I must now wait and see if I am elected. If I then become Minister elect.

Waiting can be difficult. How do you continue to live in the moment?

Take Jesus words from Matthews Gospel. Chapter 6:25, ***'Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own'***

As I write I must wait. I will strive to wait without worrying.

I am not sure what others are facing. Perhaps together we can keep worry in perspective, Isaiah 41:10, says, ***'...do not fear, for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you. I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand....'***

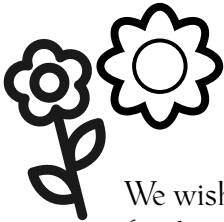

We have just returned from our annual parish three-day silent retreat at St Epiphanius' Priory. The more experienced also know that temperatures in the house are

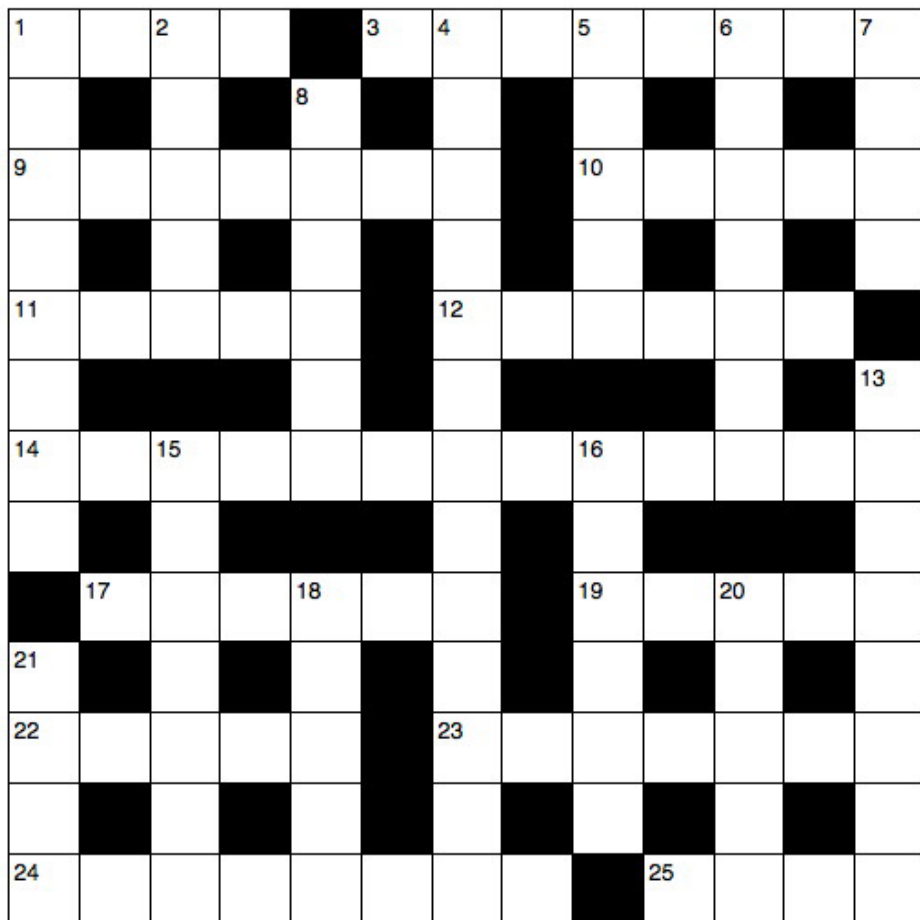
