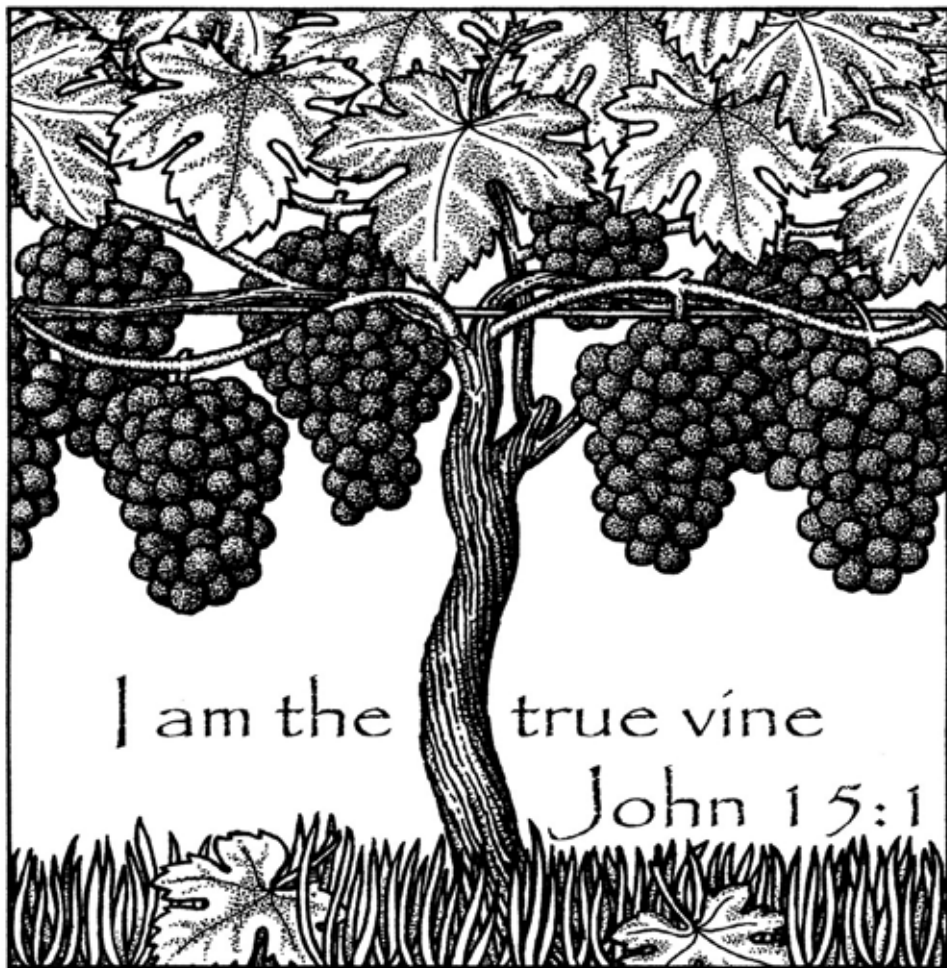

One concern for the office bearers at St Mary's is the ongoing need to meet the financial requirements expected of us by the Church of Scotland centrally. We seek to increase income and reduce expenditure. We are aware any shortfall locally has an impact on the

Thank you for your on-going support. However, I am aware we would not be where we are had it not been for the legacy we inherit. The legacy we inherit is not only physical and financial it is importantly spiritual.

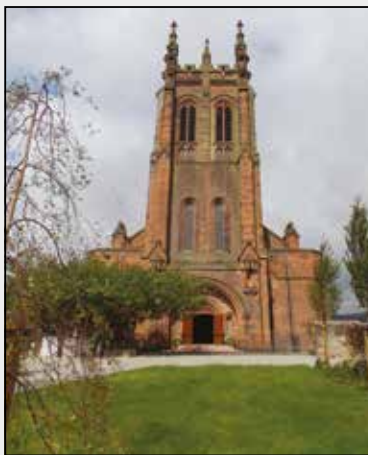

## Session Report

Welcome back to the start of our new session – I hope you have had an enjoyable time over the summer months. The summer break has been a particularly busy period this year, with two key activities taking up a considerable amount of time and effort.

The first of these activities is in regard to recruitment and you will see details of

two new appointments contained within the nursery report, elsewhere in this edition of the magazine. I would like to add my welcome to Elaine and Margaretann as they prepare to take up their new roles in September.

As well as providing administrative support to the nursery, Margaretann also fills the role of Church Secretary, so she will be your first point of contact if you call in to the Church Office.

Lynn finishes her time with us as Church Secretary and Nursery Administrator in just a few weeks from now (after more than 15 years in the role). I would once again like to record my thanks to Lynn and pass on our very best wishes for the future.

The second activity that has been keeping the office bearers very busy over the past couple of months is in regard to our finances. You will be aware that for 6 years now, we have not been in a position to meet our full allocation to the Ministry & Mission fund. It was recognised that, in order to prevent our reserves from being depleted, it was necessary to withhold the element of the Presbytery dues associated with the support of other congregations. This situation has continued on an annual basis, but throughout this time we have met our contribution to local ministry in full, as well as our contribution to the wider work of the Church.

It is worth noting that had we not taken this step our reserves would have been completely depleted and at December 2017 we would have been "overdrawn" by a figure in excess of £27,000. In 2013, recognising the seriousness of this situation, we wrote to both Glasgow Presbytery and the General Trustees, to express our concern that we found ourselves in a situation that was clearly unsustainable. This correspondence has continued every year since and we have managed to meet with representatives of Glasgow Presbytery on a couple of occasions, but with very little progress in terms of identifying a way forward.

We have now been asked by Presbytery to draw up a Plan that sets out how we propose to address our ongoing shortfall. If you were at the Annual Stated Meeting and open Session Meeting in June, you will be aware that the Stewardship & Finance Committee proposed submitting a report to Presbytery regarding our accumulated shortfall. This didn't happen as

planned in June, but this report may now be submitted to the September meeting of Presbytery.

So the last few weeks have been a very busy time for a number of folks, as we drafted our Plan for submission to Presbytery. This plan, which is nearing completion of the first draft, recognises the stewardship that the congregation has been engaged in throughout this time, as well as outlining our proposals for ongoing stewardship.

It is hoped that Glasgow Presbytery will work with us in support of the development and implementation of our plan. I also expect to be in a position to share this plan with you in the near future.

Therefore to enable Ministries and Mission to be paid in full for the year we need to increase income by 25.42% or make substantial savings in expenditure.

Our accounts now show that our General Fund is in deficit and this matter requires to be rectified very soon, otherwise we may run into difficulties with OSCR (Office of Scottish Charities Regulator).

We are currently planning a stewardship campaign and considering other avenues to raise funds as there appears to be little scope to reduce costs. Watch this space for updates.

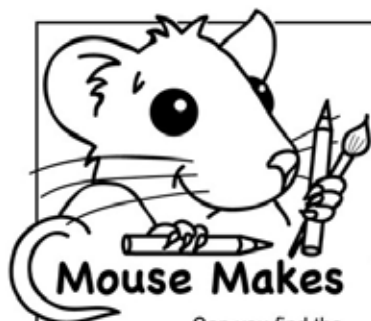
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## *Stewardship*

Biblically, stewardship is about faithfully protecting and preserving what is most important, about growing and developing the potential of everything and everyone under one's care. It is about faithfully discharging the duties and carrying out the responsibilities that we have been authorised to do. It is the first and most basic act of being human, the first charge given in the garden to "cultivate and keep" (Genesis 2:15).

Jesus used the metaphor of the steward (manager) to describe the basic faithfulness of the disciple (Luke 16:1-15). To be sure, stewardship is not just maintenance; it is also about growth, protection and taking care of all God has delegated to us (Matthew 25:14-30), so that God will be revealed in the world. Stewardship is a response to God's "manifold grace" and is expressed in serving "one another with whatever gift" we have received and with the "strength that God supplies" (1 Peter 4:10-11).

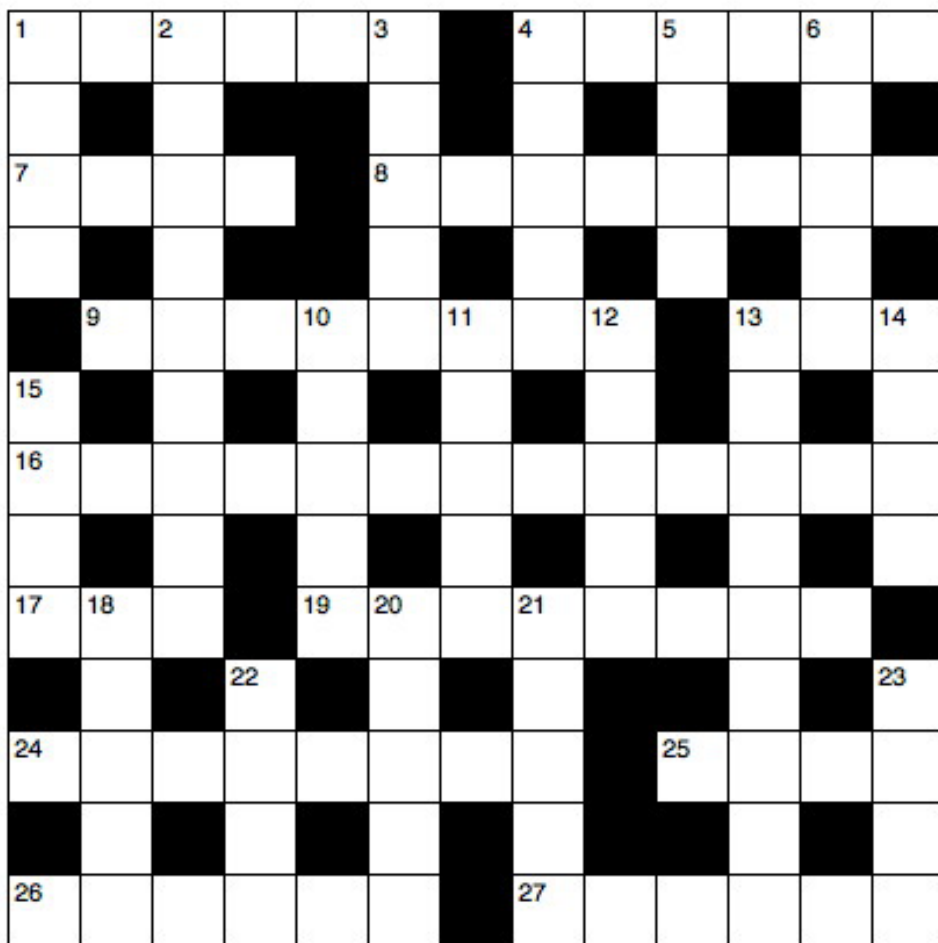
offers to take your original room.

You make it clear that you are extremely deaf and so all the lectures will, sadly, be wasted on you. You also add that you will need some time alone to prepare for a surfeit of funerals which inexplicably all came in the day before you left and that you also will need time out to exercise your dog.

By the end of that first session, you will have accounted for your absence for the rest of the week. In my case, it passed delightfully with gentle strolls in the grounds, visits to the local second-hand bookshops and much silent meditation in one's room. I attended the final session in order to congratulate the leader for his magnificent course, was effusive in my comments on those wretched evaluation forms and on my return wrote a letter of thanks to the bishop for having thought I was worthy of receiving pre-retirement training – while also noting that I was sure it would be of use when I begin to make plans for that happy event in a few decades time.
