

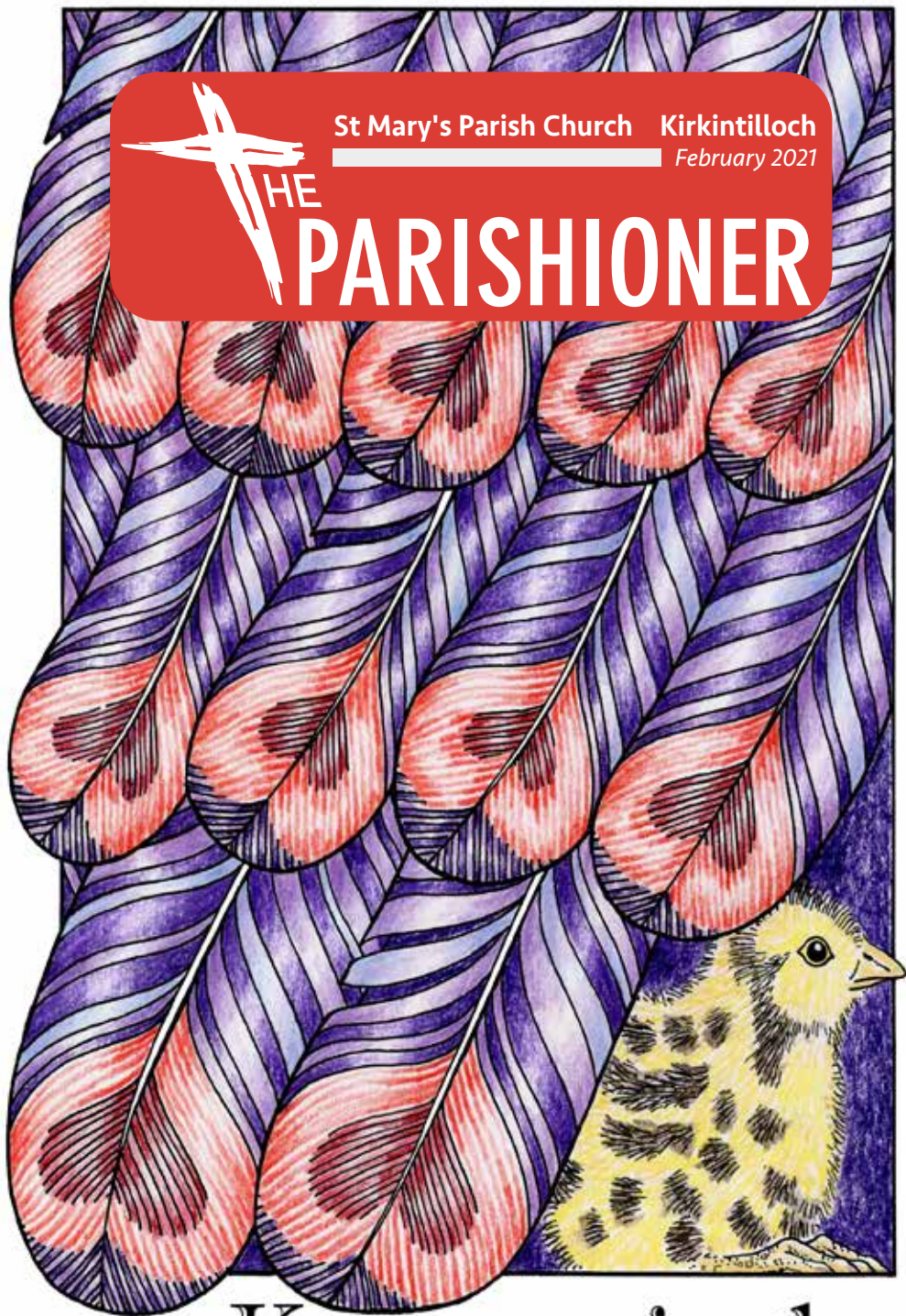

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Vacancy Business

The four main issues occupying our energies in recent weeks have been:

- **The vote by the Kirk Session to agree to depart from the Church's practice in relation to human sexuality in respect of the current vacancy (Act 1, 2015);**
- **The formation of the Electoral Register/Roll (a list of those who are eligible to vote in the election of a Nominating Committee and our next Minister - now completed and submitted to the Presbytery of Glasgow);**
- **The creation of our Parish Profile (almost finalised, just awaiting the approval of the Advisory Committee of the Presbytery of Glasgow);**
- **And the formation of the Nominating Committee.**

Nominations for service on the Nominating Committee were to be submitted by 31/01/21 and I am pleased to advise you that after a due process, 20 nominations have been received. Our Nominating

Committee is to be composed of 13 individuals. In light of this number we will now be required to contact the congregation by email and/or post/hand delivery to provide summary information

regarding each person nominated and to seek votes for the requisite number of persons. Separate information will be sent directly to all those on the Electoral Register/ Roll with a return date for ballot papers of 20/02/21.

A little background to their work may be helpful:

Those chosen by our congregation to serve have a very important task in the life of our congregation. They have been asked to discern where God is leading our congregation, and to identify the minister that God is calling to serve his people in our community. The Nominating Committee (formerly known as the Vacancy Committee) will make itself well informed on all aspects of the life and work of the congregation –

membership, attendance, finance, organisations, activities, difficulties, future plans, etc. The Committee has been elected to look for and recommend one person deemed to be suitable to be the minister of the congregation and parish.

Please support them prayerfully. Prayer is essential and the Committee will seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit in all its endeavours. All meetings of the Committee will be opened and closed in prayer, as well as whenever key or contentious decisions are approached.

The Committee will have the advice, guidance and help of myself at all times during the Vacancy. I will be present at meetings of the Committee.
The Presbytery Advisory

Committee consists of three people, appointed by the Presbytery, to advise the congregation through the time of vacancy. The Nominating Committee will meet with the Advisory Committee to receive guidance prior to beginning its work and it may ask for additional meetings at any other time it feels advice would be beneficial. The Presbytery Advisory Committee can also insist on a meeting with the Nominating Committee at any time it thinks such a meeting would be desirable. The Nominating Committee must also consult with the Presbytery Advisory Committee before it reports to the Kirk Session and Presbytery regarding the identity of the nominee.

The Committee at its first meeting will appoint a Convener, Vice-Convener and Clerk. While the Interim

Moderator may attend meetings of the Committee as adviser and assessor, the Interim Moderator must, on no account, seek to influence the choice of the Nominating Committee. Applicants should be allowed to deal directly with the Committee. The Convener should open and close all meetings with prayer and ensure that all matters brought before the Committee are dealt with in a business-like manner. The Clerk will be responsible for keeping minutes of all proceedings and for correspondence with all those interested in the vacancy.

The Nomination Committee has a maximum of two years in which to bring the name of a Nominee to the congregation. Please be aware that while many vacancies are filled in a much shorter time,

recently it has taken many congregations significant time before finding the right minister. We will not let this discourage us.

It should be fully understood from the very beginning that the work of the Committee is confidential at all times. It should not be discussed with other members of the congregation or with others outside the congregation, including family members.

Once we have a nominee, and he or she has accepted, careful discussion needs to take place between the Nominating Committee, the nominee and the Interim Moderator to ensure that the name doesn't leak out before

his or her existing congregation is properly informed.

Two final points.

The new Manse is on schedule to be completed for us by 08/04/21, and thereafter we will require to complete the garage conversion in order to meet the standards for Manse occupancy by 121, and plans are already in hand for this work to be undertaken.

The Church of Scotland has approved temporary legislation during Covid-19 to allow us to meet, interview, hear and vote for our next Minister and I shall set out the practical arrangements for this in a later edition of the Parishioner.

Treasurer Report

As we pass the year end, which is also the end of our Church financial year, and Hugh Biggans and myself gather, prepare and present the year information in the form of accounts acceptable to The Church of Scotland and OSCR, I felt it worthy of note to offer the following thoughts.

THANK YOU.

Hugh and I have throughout the year been watching our financial position, being aware of temporary closure due to the pandemic and the impact that, that was, and could have. We have closely monitored and kept a check on expenditure, reducing costs where appropriate. Hugh has also been doing Gift Aid Tax claims quarterly, whereby he would normally only do 2 in the year; all in the effort to ease cash flow. It has been encouraging to

see our cash flow predictions outstripped in a positive way; in other words in a better fashion than we expected. This has been down to a vast array of contributory factors, some mentioned above. One of these would be that you have continued to provide your Church Offerings even during closure. When I compare our offering receipts for 2020 during what everyone knows to be a difficult year, to the totals for 2019, our income from this source falls short by only £3,242.89 in the year. Thank you for this, it has helped enormously, you supporting your Church, and has made our job easier in managing the situation. It would be too early to say how our year end performance sits as there is a lot of analysis to do; but suffice to say that with your contributing help it is looking better than expected. There

have been quite a few new standing orders for offering set up during our closure. I am aware that this does not suit everyone, but it does help to regularise income and aids cash flow.

As I say it doesn't suit all, and it goes without saying I am encouraged and grateful to receive offerings by whatever means available and suitable to you, standing order, cheque or bank transfer, or indeed cash where appropriate.

Going forward this year: Ministries and Mission Contributions for 2021: Our net liability for this year is £52,222 after adjustment

for vacancy allowance, (£59,499 in 2020), resulting in a reduction on last year of £7,277. This is based on our average income base during the years 2017-2019 of £121,629 used by The Church of Scotland for calculation. Therefore, I propose to pay this in the usual 10 instalments 15th Feb to 15th Nov at £5,222.20 per month. We do of course still have Locum fee liabilities payable to The Church of Scotland over and above this, currently to the value of £938.50 every month. A point of note; it was very heartening, encouraging, and far less stressful, to receive our end of year statement from Church of Scotland showing full payment of our allocations and carrying forward no liabilities. This has only been possible with the support of YOU, The Congregation, firstly in supporting us in our 2019 Advent Appeal which ran

on into early 2020, until we were in the amazing position to be able to pay the outstanding Ministries and Mission liability for previous years of £60,000 in full. And secondly, by continuing to support your Church by sending offerings and financial support during 2020 as mentioned previously. This has allowed us to continue to pay our bills and requirements to The Church of Scotland.

Presbytery Dues For 2021: £3,892 for this year (£3,777 in 2020). This is based on the same average income base used for Ministries and Mission above. This is up £115 on last year, payable in 2 instalments by 31st March and 30th June.

St Mary's will also be engaging in the work required in preparing the new Manse to be acceptable to Presbytery and The Church of Scotland for our new

Minister when the vacancy process is complete. We are going to incur a fair amount of expense in meeting the criteria and conditions of The Manse Condition Schedule and Regulations as set out by The Church of Scotland. This will be necessary expense, absolutely unavoidable for us to be in a position to welcome our new Minister when that time comes. We have also recently had the boiler that provides heating for the halls serviced and it has been reported that this has deteriorated to the point it will need to be replaced this year. Another unavoidable expense that the fabric and finance committees will require to investigate options and seek advice available to us. Your continued support, help and encouragement is most welcome.

What is Lent?

Why do we celebrate it by giving things up?

Lent is a time of self-reflection and self-denial in preparation for the celebration of Christ's death and resurrection during Holy Week.

Before Jesus began his earthly ministry, he spent 40 days in the wilderness (Luke 4: 1-13; read this if you like).

We do not know much about that time, other than the fact that he fasted and prayed and was tempted by the devil.

So, in the same way, we ought to spend time fasting and praying in preparation for our ministry of bringing the good news of the risen Christ to the world.

Our celebration of Holy Week often coincides on the calendar with the Jewish celebration of Passover.

In preparation for Passover, our Jewish friends must do a thorough cleaning of their houses and kitchens and get rid of all their old food.

The Passover meal must be prepared with all new and fresh ingredients.

In the same way, we ought to use this time of Lent to do some "spring cleaning" ourselves.

Traditionally, Christians will fast from something (usually certain foods or drink or certain activities) during the 40 days

of Lent (apart from Sundays, which is a weekly celebration of Christ's resurrection).

This is to remind us of the great sacrifice that Christ made for us.

Jesus gave up so much to restore our relationship to God (Philippians 2), is it too much to ask of us to give something up for 40 days?

The very first Valentine Card, a Legend

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home with their wives, instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage. A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but who couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison awaiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14th February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.'

So, the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.

Ash Wednesday . . . A good time to admit you are sorry

Have you done something which haunts you? Which makes you feel restless and defensive, every time you think of it? Why not deal with it this month, and put it behind you? Whatever your mistake has been, consider what the Bible has to say to you:

‘I have not come to call the virtuous but sinners to repentance’ (said Jesus). (Luke 5.32)

‘Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon. (Isaiah 55.7)

‘Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.’ (Joel 2:12-13)

God is inviting you to come to Him this Ash Wednesday. What a wonderful offer! Make the most of it and remember how the prodigal son was welcomed back by his compassionate father.

St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

I appreciated your recent concern when you heard one of our parishioners had slipped on a gravestone. Your desire to help was entirely commendable, and I do know that sending your own church's health and safety officer to give us some advice was kindly meant. But the 200-page report was not welcome. If we implemented even half of your officer's suggestions, life would become unbearably safe.

St James the Least of All has survived perfectly well for the last 600 years without gutter cleaning inspections, path degreasing and electrical safety certificates, so I think we may survive a little longer without them. As far as I am aware, the only disaster to hit us was when Cromwell's soldiers stabled their horses in the nave – which I suspect a few of our oldest members still clearly remember.

The shock the sidesmen sometimes get when switching on the lights occurs only occasionally, is relatively mild and soon over – and if it happens when preparing for the 8am Service, helps to wake them up. The weight of the Duke of Clumber's marble sarcophagus is slowly detaching the south aisle from the rest of the church, but it is very slow – and the pews

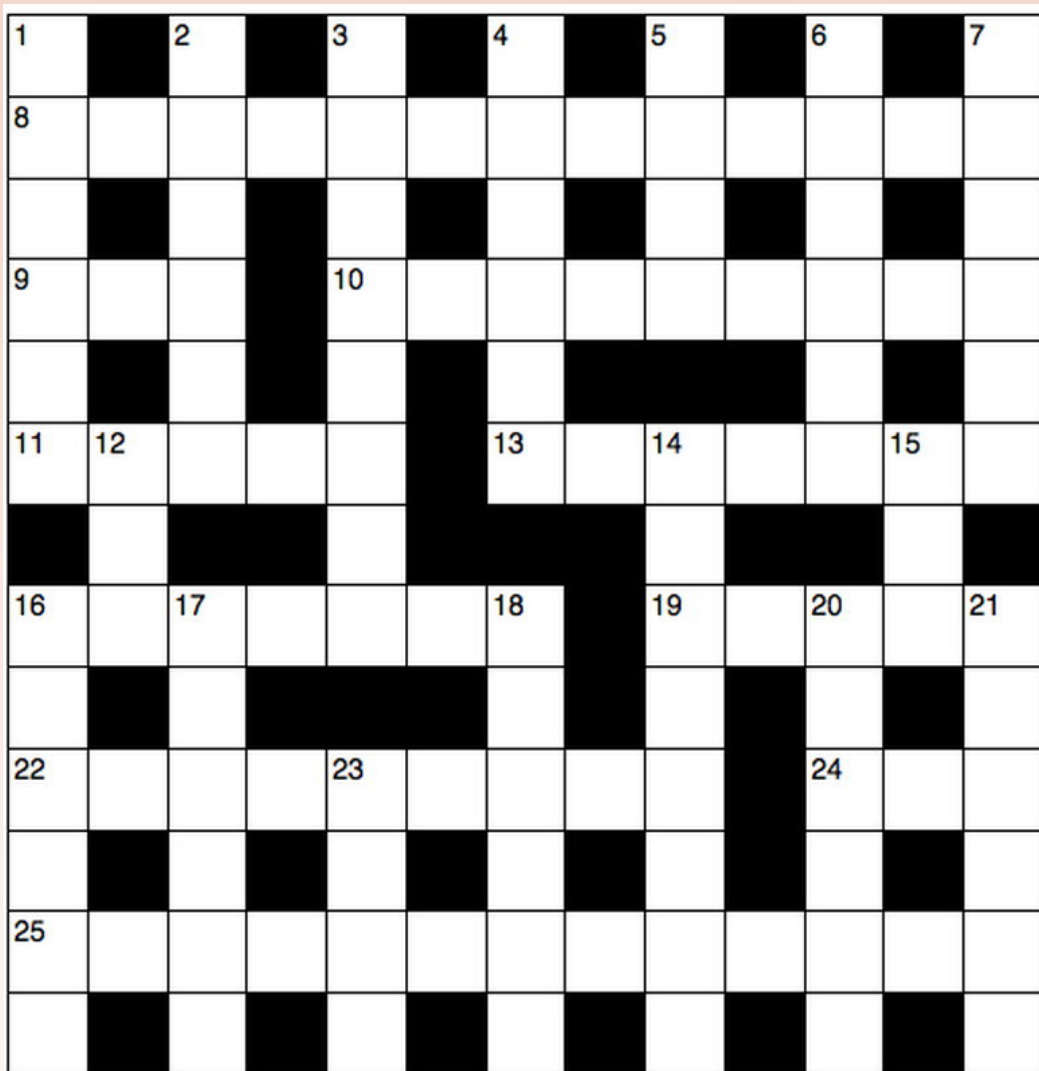
in that area are used only once a year when his relations visit from America to commemorate his death at Agincourt – which is probably just beyond remembrance of the oldest of our congregation.

Leaks from the ceiling in the north aisle are solved with a row of buckets – and even you must concede that the fungi on the oak beams look really rather attractive when the sun catches them. The sapling growing out of the spire is certainly an issue – although it looks so attractive in Spring when in blossom. As for our fire extinguishers, they were serviced when my predecessor-but-two was in office, and I have the certificate to prove it.

So, do thank your health and safety officer for all his work and tell him we will bear his recommendations in mind. Also tell him I was so sorry he slipped and broke his leg in our choir stalls while he was with us. But that bit of floor has been out of alignment since 1748, and it seems a shame to disturb it now. If only he had arrived encased in bubble wrap, it would never have happened. Perhaps you could put that on the agenda of your next health and safety meeting.
