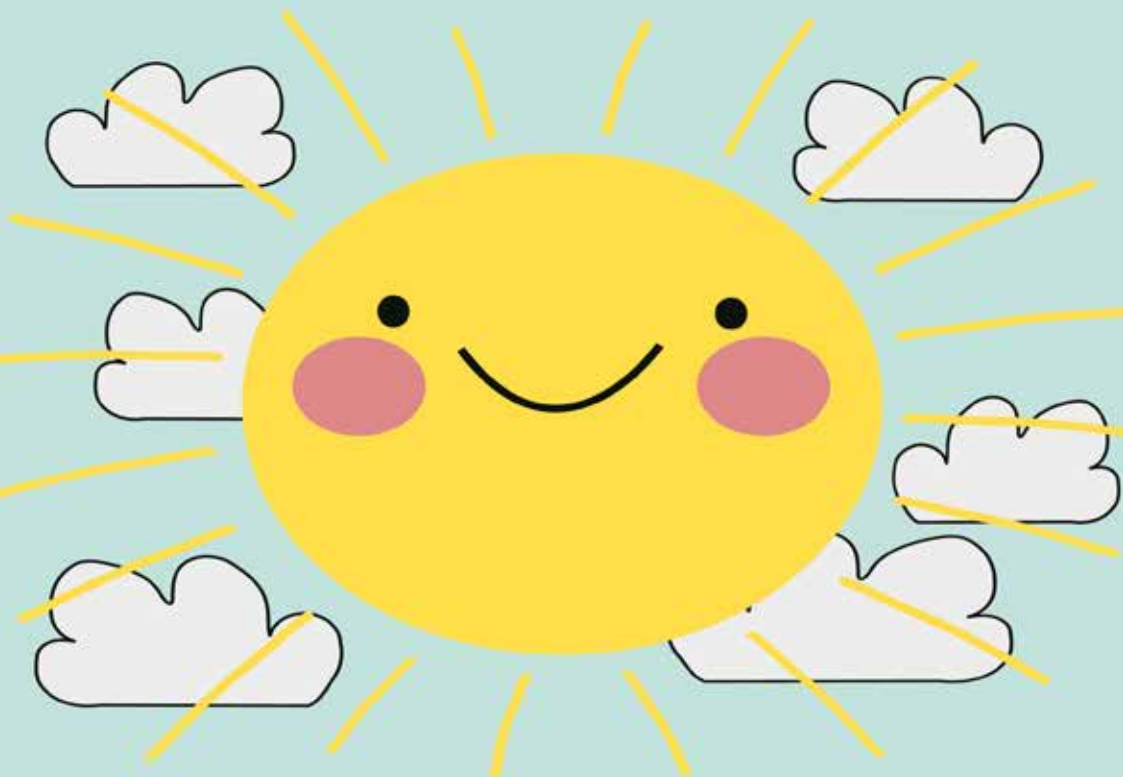

From the Interim Moderator . . .

General Assembly 2021

May 22nd - 27th, 2021

This year the Kirk will meet again 'online' via Zoom in General Assembly. I anticipate that by the time you are receiving this copy of *The Parishioner*, discussions and debate will be well underway. Some of you may be subscribers to Life and Work, whose current May edition gives a foretaste of some of the hot topics that will be considered this year. Of particular concern to many of us in the Church is the target that the Church has set of having only six hundred ministries by 2025. That is, forecasting suggests that there will be around six hundred full-time ministries across Ministers of Word and Sacrament and Ministry Development Staff by the middle of this decade. Presbyteries will be required to plan for these posts in a fresh round of Presbytery planning, starting shortly

after the General Assembly. **In effect this will probably mean that after the General Assembly of this year it will be unlikely that any congregation which becomes vacant will automatically be allowed to call a new Minister.**

The figure of six hundred comes about for three main reasons. Firstly, because it is projected that over 400 ministers will reach retirement age in the next few years. That represents about 60% of the Ministers currently in charges. Secondly, recruitment has been lower than the number of retirements for many years, a difference of about 20 people per annum which builds, over time, into a significant reduction. Finally, financial projections strongly suggest that a diminishing Church will only be able to afford around six hundred ministries. We can afford no more unless something changes.

Therefore I am delighted to express my gratitude to your Nominating Committee whose members have worked prayerfully and enthusiastically to present their recommendation that Rev. Dr. Ruth H.B. Morrison, M.A., B.D., Ph.D. be invited to preach as Sole Nominee on 30/05/21 at 11am. in St. Mary's.

Vacancy Business relating to the Sole Nominee Preaching on 30th May at 11.00am

The Presbytery of Glasgow has allowed us to proceed with these arrangements under special Covid Vacancy Protocols, and what follows I hope clearly sets out how the arrangements will operate.

Members and adherents who have registered and whose names are listed on the Electoral Register/Roll will be able to vote using the Ballot Paper enclosed with this edition of the church magazine having:

- Physically attended the Service on 30/05/21 at 11am (book to attend this Service in the normal manner);

- Viewed the Service online which will be available from 6pm via our Website and YouTube channel on 30/05/21;
- Attended a viewing of the Service replayed in the Church on Wednesday 02/06/21 at 11am (book to attend this Service in the normal manner);
- requested a DVD of the Service or an Audio CD of the Service to allow them to watch or listen by contacting the Session Clerk, not later than 02/06/21 at 11am (Gordon Morrison ☎ 0141 578 5887.)

Immediately after members/adherents have attended or viewed/ listened to this Service, a vote on whether or not Rev. Dr. Ruth H. B. Morrison, M.A., B.D., Ph.D. should be appointed as the new minister of this congregation of Kirkintilloch St. Mary's Church will be opened.

For those attending in Church on 30/05/21 and 02/06/21 completed Ballot Papers (please remember to bring them with you!) should be placed in the Ballot Box(es) as you leave. Those watching online or viewing a DVD or listening to a CD should return the printed version to the Session Clerk or scan and send an email version to him (Gordon Morrison ☎ morrisgo@sky.com) by 5pm on 05/06/21 at the latest. Every vote returned must have a unique number written on it. Each person eligible to vote will receive their unique number printed on their ballot paper prior to the opening of the vote.

Votes returned without a unique number will not be counted. The unique numbers will not be linked to how votes are cast. **All votes must be cast or returned not later than Saturday 05/06/21 at 5pm. The Ballot Box(es) will be opened and counted on Sunday 06/06/21 and the result declared online and intimated to the congregation as soon as is practicable.**

Thereafter, assuming the vote is a positive one; arrangements will be put in place to allow members/adherents to sign 'The Call Notice.' Further details of the arrangements for signing 'The Call' will be advised later.

Vacancy Business relating to the New Manse

We took possession of the keys to the new Manse at Braes of Yett on 29/04/21. Presbytery has approved the plans for the garage conversion into an additional room to comply with the General Trustees New Manse Guidelines. We have applied for a Building Warrant from East Dunbartonshire Council and once this has been received the builders expect to complete the works within 10 working days. Thereafter some other minor internal works will be undertaken (i.e. alarm installation, floor coverings, window coverings, TV aerial, phone installation, garden shed).

Young Church

We celebrate Pentecost on Sunday 23rd May this year. Pentecost celebrates the birthday of the church.

The day when Jesus fulfilled His promise of sending to his followers the Spirit of God to be with them and in them. This coming of God as the Holy Spirit was marked by the sounds and signs of God's power - a power which enabled them to carry out the task of taking the good news to the ends of the earth. God's Spirit still empowers Christians today to share and show the love of God and bring people into His kingdom. This promise is for young and old, men and women and 'for your children' (see Acts 2 verses 17-18 and 39). The story is found in Acts chapter 2.

The story takes place in the city of Jerusalem, not long after Jesus had been raised from the dead. The disciples had all gathered in the city, as Jesus had told them. They were waiting for the gift of the Holy Spirit that Jesus had promised to them. On the day of Pentecost, they were all together in one room. And suddenly there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty tornado. It filled the whole house where they were meeting. And flames of fire came down from heaven and rested just above the head of each person in the room. And when this happened, they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak in other languages—even languages they had never spoken before!

It caused a big commotion—such a big commotion that other people came running to see what was going on. And when they saw and heard the Christians speaking in all these different languages, they were confused. “How can this be?” they asked. “We come from many different countries, and we all speak many different languages, and yet each of us can understand what these people are saying.”

And then Peter stepped forward. He explained to the crowd that Jesus of Nazareth—whom they had crucified barely two months before—had been raised from the dead, and was now up in heaven, sitting at the right hand of God. He told them that Jesus was the Messiah they had been waiting for—sent by God for the salvation of the world.

Many of the people in the crowd were deeply moved. They asked Peter, “What should we do?” He told them to turn away from their sins, to

turn to God, and to be baptized. And the Bible tells us that 3000 people were baptized and added to the church that day.

Can you imagine what it would have been like to have been there? To have felt and heard and experienced first-hand God's Spirit at work. To have been part of the new thing that God was creating that day – this new community of faith: the church.

Well, we might not have been there in Jerusalem all those years ago, but we are part of it, aren't we? We too are part of the church—the family of God—that came into being on that day in Jerusalem so long ago.

And just as God's Spirit filled and inspired those first Christians, so God also fills and inspires all of us who are open to the coming of His Holy Spirit. Praise God!

Pentecost Activities at Home

- After reading the story from Acts 2:1-41 in your Bible or your children's story Bible together, read it again and use your voices to make the following sound effects: whooshing wind, crackling flames, and babbling voices. End with a round of celebratory applause!
- Wonder about the story together by asking: What part of the story amazes you the most?
- Tell each other about a person who has taught you about Jesus and what you learned from them.
- Decorate (or have your children decorate!) a room or an area in your house to celebrate the birth of the church. If you have got flame-coloured streamers or balloons, great. If not, that is okay too. Use whatever you have on hand. Don't forget to sing Happy Birthday!
- What is a birthday without a cake (or something else that is sweet to eat)? Make a cake and decorate with some strawberries (to symbolise flames) on top!

- Explain to your kids that, like the wind, we cannot see the Holy Spirit. Make pinwheels and invite your kids to blow into them as you talk about how wind works. <https://teachbesideme.com/how-to-make-pinwheels-with-templates>
- Go for a walk and see who can find signs of the wind at work. Talk about ways the Holy Spirit is at work too!

Pentecost in Jerusalem

On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of Firstfruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, He had risen, and He had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so, they waited – on Him, and for Him.

They were not disappointed, for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ's body here on earth. Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now His Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, His body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the Gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their sins, and to follow Him.

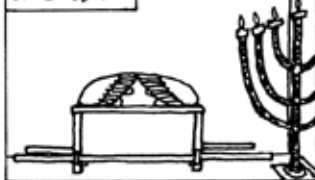
Bible Bite

for speeding, and not social distancing, should boost our constabulary's figures for the next 12 months.

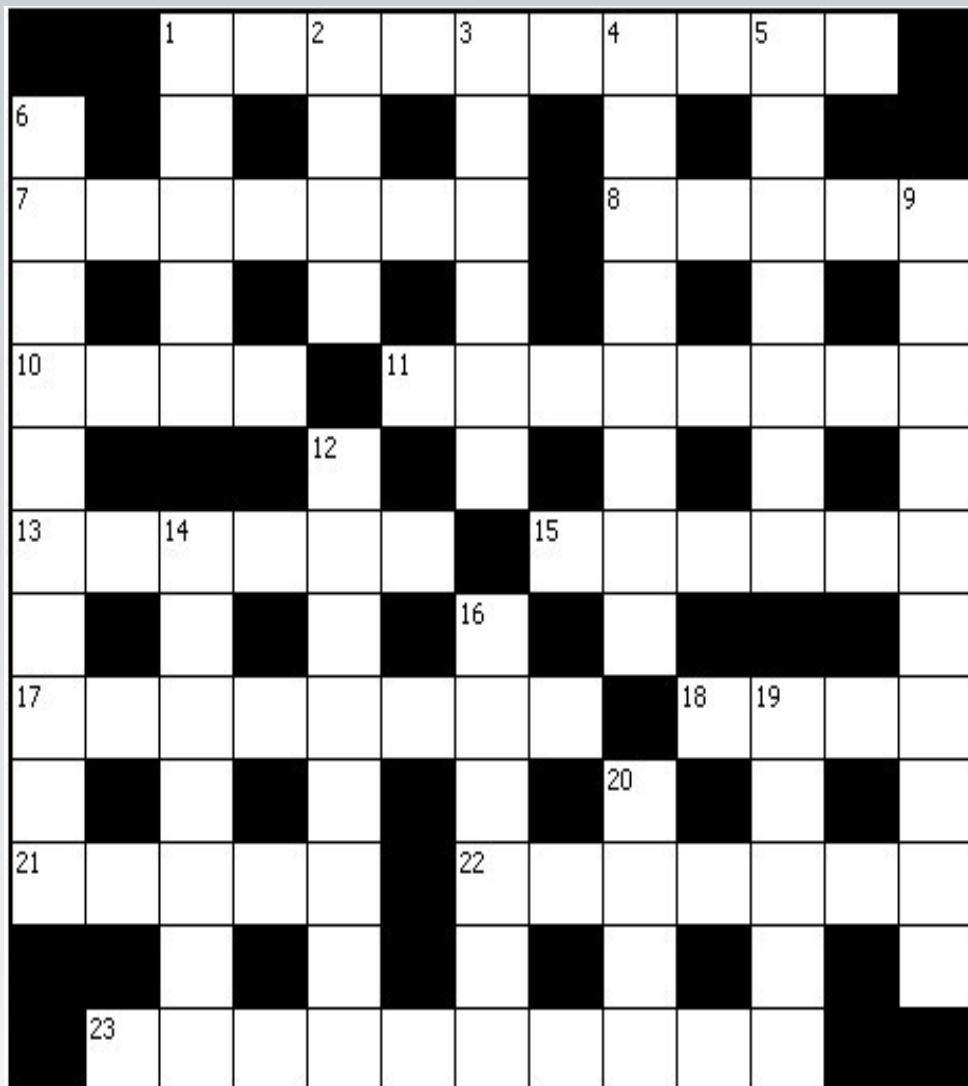

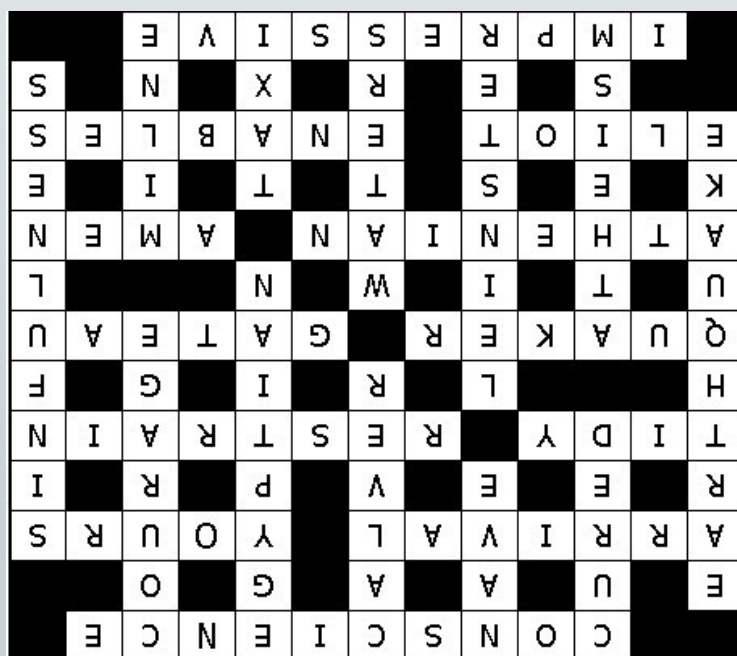
