



Pastoral Letter...

Dear Friends,

It was so good to join with the congregations in our cluster on Sunday 22nd January to worship together in Lenzie Old Parish Church. The sanctuary was packed, the sermon spot on and the singing - wow! - it was superb! It was a joy to be there and praise God together.

For those who were present or watched later online, you will know from the all-age chat that I am now a LEGO convert, having received an orchid at Christmas from the botanical collection! It takes pride of place in my study and every time I see it, it makes me think about Jesus' words when he spoke about us being part of the vine and Paul's words about the church being like a body with many parts. Like LEGO pieces, we are all different. We are made up of different ages, genders, interests, gifts and talents and we were reminded of that in hymn 204 from CH4 on Sunday:

We're many kinds of people with many kinds of faces: All colours and all ages too, from all times and places (and yet), I am the Church! You are the Church! We are the Church together! All who follow Jesus, all around the world, yes, we're the Church together.

In Jesus, through baptism, we are one, we are the church, and it is Jesus' prayer that we should be united in faith, hope and love. Each of us is important and have a purpose within the vine, the body, the family of God, and, on Sunday we saw something of what that might look like at its best.

I am very encouraged and look forward to continuing the conversations within the cluster and with St David's Memorial Park. As intimated, our Kirk Sessions met together for the second time in early January and the conversation was very positive. We agreed at the end of that meeting that we should work towards a union of

St Mary's and St David's Memorial Park and decided that the next steps would be for a smaller group of people, comprising Elders and members from both congregations, to be formed and take things forward. All going well this will happen in the coming weeks, so that we can get on and move ahead together.

I will keep you updated as we go but, as always, please feel free to ask any questions and know that whilst we do not want to waste any time, we will, at every step, be seeking to do things prayerfully, carefully, and wisely. So, please pray. Pray for all the conversations that will happen between St Mary's and St David's Memorial Park. Pray for our cluster. Pray for Glasgow Presbytery and the Church of Scotland as a whole. And, when you've done that, look outwards and around you and beyond, and pray some more! For in and through all of this, we need to remember that Jesus is at the centre and it's God's mission in the world that we, the church, are called to participate in. So, let's keep our eyes open, our ears listening, our hands serving, and get our hearts ever in tune with heaven, as we seek God's Kingdom come.

Here's to our next joint cluster worship, here's to journeying with Jesus on.

Places are limited as each boat can only accommodate 12 people and we have 2 boats sailing each evening. Each boat has a toilet on board and a lift for anyone who has difficulty with steps.

The Churches Walking Group

Throughout 2022 the Churches Walking Group met on Thursday afternoons for an hour's walk and talk. Six of us from St Mary's have joined this group on a regular basis along with some of the members of St Columba's Hillhead and other local churches. The largest walking group we had over the year was seventeen and the smallest was two. There was a walk every week. The format is simple. We meet at a Kirkintilloch location with reasonable car parking at 1:30. We walk for approximately 2.5 miles. We try to walk a circular route and are normally back at the cars by 2:45. We use local paths and lanes to avoid traffic as much as possible. These are the guidelines used on "plotaroute.com" to plan each walk.

You may gather from above that this is a gentle walk suitable for all ages. If you are available on a Thursday afternoon and would like to make some new friends, or walk with some old ones, then please come and join us. No special equipment is required. All you need is a waterproof jacket and a stout pair of shoes.

The Language of Love

Valentine's Day reminds us of the importance of expressing our love to those close to us. But how can we go beyond simply offering flowers and a card? Jesus says: 'A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another' (John 13:34). How can we express love like Jesus in our everyday relationships to our partner, children, neighbours or work colleagues? **Listening**

We need to listen to others, just as Jesus did. He asked questions of people and waited for them to process their answer. According to James, 'everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry' (James 1:19). How well do we listen to others? How often do we find ourselves already thinking of what we want to say before somebody's finished speaking? Listening takes time; don't rush it!

Touching

Jesus reached out to touch the untouchables in His world, including lepers, the sick and children. This was completely out of character for rabbis of His day. For us today, a warm handshake may be of value. Of course, it should always be an appropriate touch – helpful for the other person, not just for ourselves.

Speaking

Jesus' conversation was always full of grace and truth (John 1:14). Do we speak words of grace, by offering comfort, giving encouragement or expressing care and concern? However, we should also be ready to speak words of truth, in asking for forgiveness, seeking reconciliation or addressing conflict. As Paul urges us, don't avoid: 'speaking the truth in love'.

Where is the challenge for us in expressing love this Valentine's Day?

Young Church

This year we celebrate the beginning of Lent in February. Lent is the period of six weeks (40 days not including Sundays) leading up to **Easter,** an important festival in the Christian calendar. Lent starts on Wednesday 22nd February and is known as **Ash Wednesday.** The last week of Lent is called **Holy Week.**

The Story of Lent

Jesus went into the desert to fast and pray before beginning his work for God. Jesus was tempted several times by Satan but was able to resist.

Lent allows Christians to remember Jesus's fasting in the desert. It is a time of giving things up and a test of self-discipline.

There are many foods that some Christians do not eat in Lent, such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. Some Christians just give up something they really enjoy, such as cakes or chocolate.

The day before Lent starts is Shrove Tuesday. This is also known as Pancake Day and was traditionally the last chance to use up the foods Christians would not be eating during Lent. This year Shrove Tuesday is on February 21st.

Pancakes became associated with Shrove Tuesday as they were a simple meal that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour. Shrove comes from the verb 'to shrive' which means to confess sins.
