

Pastoral Letter...

Dear Friends.

I recently went in search of something that I had lost and though I didn't find what I was looking for, I came across lots of other things that I had forgotten about! One of those things was a journal I kept in 2005 when I was exploring my calling to ministry. It made for interesting reading, particularly a quote that I had jotted down after a World Day of Prayer event. At that time, following my trip to Ghana, I wasn't sure whether God was calling me to ministry in Scotland or some other work overseas. On the day in question, a lady from the Salvation Army had been speaking and she said this: 'The light that shines the furthest, shines the brightest at home.' The words are attributed to a couple of people but, whoever said it, stopped me in my tracks that day and, when I read them again a week ago, gave me food for thought.

The Church of Scotland is moving through unprecedented change and the presbytery mission planning process has left many weary and uncertain about the future. Yet, though the way of doing church has to inevitably change if we are to thrive and grow, our calling as God's church remains the same. We are to love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength and love our neighbour as we love ourselves. It is you and me that are tasked with sharing the good news of Jesus with the world in faith, word and action and, it seems to me, that it is here, in Kirkintilloch, that we are asked to start. For 'the light that shines the furthest, shines brightest at home.'

Of course, we are getting to the time of year when we are hopeful of blue skies, warmer air and maybe even some sunshine. I hope that you will find and make time to rest in the sun and, of course, the Son, and be recharged, a bit like a solar light! For if we are to shine, then we need to take time to come into the presence of the light of the world, breathe in deeply, enjoy the extraordinary in the ordinary and spend a bit of time looking around, praying and wondering what next? We can't always be on the go, we need to strike a balance, and I hope you will find it this summer.

Finally, in a recent conversation, one of you folks said, "as always we had a good wee team," and that, friends, makes all the difference in the world. Thank you so much to each one of you who contribute to the life of St Mary's, often quietly, behind the scenes, without any fuss. It doesn't go unnoticed, and it is appreciated; you make the church brighter by your life and work. Might it be that 'the light that shines the furthest, shines the brightest at home?'

Session Report

The Kirk Session met on Wednesday 17th May. For a variety of reasons, this was our first meeting since February and so we had a very full agenda to deal with! I have picked out some of the key topics of discussion and some dates for our diaries.

Basis of Union

Within the nominated group, we are progressing our conversations with representatives from St David's Memorial Park and we will continue to share our Newsletter on a regular basis. The group are working towards the completion of the "Basis of Union" document, as well as a supporting document that will provide a narrative around our plans and proposals in terms of Mission and Outreach.

One of the requirements for completing the Basis of Union is agreeing the name of the new united congregation. To that end, we are looking for your help:

For the next three weeks, we will have a box at the front door of the Church. If you have any suggestions for a new name, please take the time to jot it down and pop it in the box. Last date for "entries" – Sunday 18th of June.

A couple of things to note

 Churches need to be named with a geographical prefix – our congregations are currently named:

Kirkintilloch – St Mary's Parish Church; and Kirkintilloch – St David's Memorial Park So our new name is expected to be prefixed in the same way.

 It is also suggested that, as it would be very difficult to incorporate the names of all

three previous congregations (St David's Memorial, St Mary's and Park Church), the name of the united congregation should be something "New".

i.e. not contain a reference to the existing names.

Stated Annual Meeting

The congregational meeting on the 18th June will also serve as our Stated Annual Meeting, when our accounts to December 2022 will be presented, along with our budget for the current year.

Summer Worship with St David's Memorial Park

The Kirk Session have agreed that for four weeks over the summer we will hold shared worship services with St David's Memorial Park. The following dates have been agreed:

- 30th July and 6th August at St David's Memorial Park; and
- 20th and 27th August at St Mary's.

We very much look forward to sharing in this time together.

Lenzie & Kirkintilloch Cluster

As a cluster, we are planning the "Wonderzone" Holiday Club for our young folks. This will run from the 8th to the 11th August. The Tuesday and Wednesday sessions will take place at St David's Memorial Park, with the sessions on the Thursday and Friday at Lenzie Union.

Our next cluster worship service, where all four congregations meet together, will be at 11:00am on Sunday 13th August at Lenzie Union Parish Church.

The final cluster service for this year will be at St Mary's. A date has still to be fixed but it is likely to be in October or November.

There is clearly a lot happening in all our congregations in the coming weeks. As a Kirk Session, we have agreed to meet again on the 21st June, but if there is anything you would like to discuss in the meantime, as always, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Notification of new requirements for 2023:

I have received various letters and enclosures from Church of Scotland and Presbytery in relation to financial year end, Congregational Contributions Report for 2022 showing and confirming full payment of our Ministries and Mission requirement for 2022: Schedule of Financial Statistics for 2022 which I have submitted; Investment valuation report as at 31.12.22 to name but a few! With this as would be normal was our Giving To Grow Contribution Statement from Stewardship and Finance Department at 121 detailing our requirements for this year 2023. Giving to Grow is the replacement scheme to the previous Ministries and Mission. Our requirements for this year amount to £74,450 less endowment income of £1548 meaning a net figure payable of £72,902 for the year. (2022 net figure was 70,484). So this years figure is up £2,418, 3.43% against 2022 figure. It is based on a set of calculations set by The General Assembly and is based against our 2021 income as per our accounts. This amount of £72,902 is payable either in 10 or 12 monthly instalments and since historically we have chosen to pay over 10 months, I can confirm having instructed our bank to set up a standing order February to November inclusive for £7,290.20.

Presbytery Dues for 2023:

Again as would be the norm at this time of year, in late December I received communication from The Presbytery of Glasgow detailing our required dues for this year. The amount for this year is $\pounds4,280$ based on 2021 income of 133,744. At this level our contribution is 3.20%. The requested $\pounds4,280$ is up $\pounds321, 8.108\%$ up on our 2022 figure of $\pounds3959$. As the amount requested is over 4000, the requested $\pounds4,280$ is payable over 3 instalments by 31st March, 30th June and 30th September, for which as normal Presbytery accounts have provided pay in slips to facilitate payment.

I am pleased to note that our offering income over the 3 months detailed above is up by just under £1,300 on the comparable 3 months of last year. Although a concern for me would be that referring to our total offering income month by month, and our requirements monthly for Giving to Grow amounting to £7,290.20, and Presbytery of Glasgow requirement of £4,280 payable over 3 instalments by the end of September, which would equate to approx. £475 per month; this leaves a very small proportion of your giving in the month to cover all the other items of expenditure involved in operating your Church. I am also concerned that as of 1st April we have now entered new contract tariff rates for gas and electricity as previously reported to you, these being substantially higher than we were previously paying. Please also see my article providing details of our Budget for 2023.

Budget For 2023

Our Finance Committee has prepared a Budget for this year. This was presented to The Kirk Session, along with 2022 Year End Accounts, at a Kirk Session Meeting in late February. Both the budget and the accounts were duly accepted and approved and thereafter the accounts and records have gone to our appointed Independent Examiner for checking. The accounts examination is now complete, verified, and signed off. They have now been sent to Glasgow Presbytery for statutory attestation before being filed with OSCR. A set has also been sent to Church of Scotland Edinburgh and in due course when appropriate a redacted set will be published for your information. A date for a Stated Annual Meeting has been arranged at which you will have the opportunity to ask questions.

For the moment I thought I would share with you a copy of The Budget, please see enclosed.

Did you know that our expenditure for 2022 (£133,834), averaging out over 12 months amounts to £11,152.83 per month.

Referring to our budgeted expenditure for 2023 (£173,547), averaging out over 12 months would equate to £14,462.25 per month.

You will see that a big proportion of this increase is due to the increase in Heat and Light costs. New tariffs effective from April 2023 mean that our gas and electricity costs could for this year increase from £11,873 to a forecasted £42,000.

You will see from the Treasurer Report which provides details of our Offering Income for the first 3 months of this year and would illustrate how this compares to the above indicated expenditure.

The week of the evening sails is fast approaching and now is the time to think about which evening you want to come, who you would like to come with and what you would like to eat.

Dates and time of sailing

Starting on Monday 26th June and continuing all that week, ending on Friday 30th June. Each sail will last approximately 2 commencing at 6pm prompt and would like you to meet at Southbank Marina no later than 5.45pm.

Cost and food choice

The cost is £10 and includes your cruise, a chip supper, something nice afterwards and tea or coffee. The food will be delivered to the boat from Gerry's Chip Shop and the choice of accompaniment for your chips are fish, sausage or pie.

If you would like a cold drink with your meal, please bring it with you, glasses will be provided.

Because all the food is supplied by a local chip shop it may not be possible to answer all dietary needs but if in doubt please talk to us when buying a ticket and we may be able to help.

General information

There will be 2 boats available each carrying a maximum of 12 passengers and will be called boat 1 and boat 2. Both have a lift and a toilet, which is accessible to those with limited mobility.

Tickets go on sale after the service on Sunday 4th June and this will tell you:

Seagull Trust Cruises are a charity which provides free canal cruises to those with special needs and the three members of crew providing your cruise are all volunteers. The charity survives on donations, so please come prepared to buy some souvenirs to help this worthwhile cause to keep cruising.

St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

Despite my assurances that it was unnecessary, it was kind of you to loan us your sound equipment, so we could experience the advantages of using radio microphones in church. Your assurance that everyone would then be able to hear with absolute clarity seemed to miss the point that everyone does not

necessarily want to do so. I have no doubt that members of your congregation hang on to your every word, eager to make sure you remain theologically sound. But for us, those who had blissfully slumbered throughout my sermons for the last 30 years found themselves unable to filter out a single syllable.

Colonel Wainwright decided to change the start of his Bible readings from the customary "Here beginneth..." to "Testing, Testing" before giving the microphone a good biff, which made the verger dash outside to check if yet another medieval gargoyle had fallen from the roof. Also, forgetting that microphones pick up asides just as effectively, his own comment to his wife in the front pew "I thought I read that rather well" did nothing for the pride he has always cherished for his humility.

I was also not convinced that the 16th century workmen who had devoted the greater part of their lives reverently carving the Lady Chapel altar had intended it to support an electronic console that would have looked more at home in an aeroplane cockpit.

However, the event which finally decided us against microphones came about an hour after the service. Several of the choir boys had crept back into the church and decided to improvise a rock concert with their guitars and the mikes turned up full blast. The church exploded in a perfect cacophony of noise which panicked a horse and rider going by. The horse bolted down the road, which caused two cars to veer violently to avoid it. One car ended up in a pond, the other in a field, having ripped off a great deal of old fencing.

Whoever fixed the fencing failed, and later that night all 43 cows in the field escaped and ended up in the Colonel's flower-filled front garden, where they spent a comfortable night slicing his velvet turf with their sharp cleats and chomping everything in sight.
