





Pastoral Letter...

Hello everyone!

We are just a few days into Advent and already lots of carols have been sung at Open Doors, Christmas crafts have been made by children from Lairdsland Primary and the story of that first Christmas has been remembered with some residents at Campsie View Care Home (sincerest thanks to all who have made these events happen). In the manse, the tree is up, the window pictures are still sticking and our daily December visit from the Elf on the Shelf is under way! I've tried to hush in the rush, I've tried to keep up with my daily advent readings, and I've tried (and failed!) to burn my advent candle each day. What a wonderful reminder it was then, as I sat down to write, to see a post with a Christmas decoration hanging from a tree that said this: "It was never meant to be a burden. He came to set us free."

This time of year can be so very busy. There is much to do, things to get, places to go – lots of it enjoyable and fun – but it can, nevertheless, be exhausting. Add to that the pressure to remember everything and get things 'just right,' and it can feel overwhelming, filling us with a longing for it just to be over already! That's before I've mentioned our fears and worries about the world (as I write, a tsunami warning has just been issued in North California, following an earthquake), or the sadness that many are facing, or the situations that leave folks wondering, 'where is the good news?' I was asked that earlier today and then found myself at the bedside of someone who was ill and sleeping. I chatted with the person's loved one for a while and then I opened my bible and shared the wonderful verses from Isaiah 9.1, 6-7: "The people who walk in darkness will see a great light. For those who live in a land of deep darkness, a light will shine ... For a child is born to us, a son is given to us. The government will rest on his shoulders. And he will be called: Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. His government and its peace will never end. He will rule with fairness and justice from the throne of his ancestor David for all eternity."

As I read, eyes opened, a heart heard and peace stirred and settled – what a gift faith is and how wonderful for us to be receivers of good news! To trust that He, who was promised by the prophets, is the one who came and lived among us. The Word who took on flesh and moved into the neighbourhood. Not to remind us of how dark the world is or how often we fail, but to show us God's love and to save us. To free us from sin, death, all that is not life giving and to shine brightly upon our path, that we might follow His way and point others to Him.

No matter what is on your to-do-list this December and beyond, may you remember the wonder of Christmas, be touched anew by the promise of God with us, and breath and let go, even as you strive and try your best; remembering that Christmas was never meant to be a burden. Jesus, the light of the world, came to set us free. Wishing you all the love, hope, joy and peace of this Season and a blessed 2025 when it comes,


Church Gardens

Session Report

The Moderator's Challenge 2024-25 - Let Your Little Light Shine

Rt Rev Dr Shaw Paterson, the Moderator of the General Assembly, is encouraging congregations to be a "light in the darkness" to help school pupils and students in Malawi reach their potential. The aim is to help fund solar power energy initiatives which will enable children to do their homework and advance their education with the aid of small solar lights they can borrow from their school's 'light library'. It will also provide solar panels to enable PhD students at Zomba Theological University to study

during the hours of darkness.

The Moderator was inspired to launch this challenge after his visit to Malawi in September, where he saw the difficulties children faced in studying during the dark evenings without lights in their homes. Daylight hours in sub-Saharan Africa are short and most children are forced to do their homework by the light of candles, kerosene lamps and fire. Dr Paterson also witnessed first-hand power outages in Zomba Theological University and said the call to action fits the theme of his Moderatorial year, Building Together. He said "As much as I love a good DIY project, this theme is more about 'Building the People of God', allowing everyone at whatever level they are at, to be encouraged and supported to take the next step on their journey through life." The Moderator's Challenge also ties in with our Advent theme of "Light" and Session agreed that it would be appropriate to support the appeal at this particular time. To that end, our offerings and donations received at our Watchnight Service will be sent to the Church of Scotland, to support this worthwhile cause. More information in relation to the appeal can be found on the Church of Scotland Web Site – just search for "Let your little light shine"

Nominated Charities

The two nominated charities that we will be supporting this year are "MacMillan Cancer Research" and "British Heart Foundation". If you would like to make a monitory donation, envelopes are available at Church on a Sunday morning. Alternatively, simply hand in your donation, clearly marked for the charity of your choice.

Our collection will run throughout the Advent period, and in the New Year, monies will be passed on to the two charities.

Basis of Union

Over the last ten days, separate meetings have been held with representatives from the Presbytery of Glasgow. The first was to look at the development of our Mission Plan and to identify forms of outreach that we see as part of our future. The second looked at the facilities we have available to us and the current usage.

Follow up meetings in early 2025 will take place to allow us to make decisions that

support the ongoing needs of the new parish.



Christmas Geese

'If only I were a goose and become one of them, then I could save them.' Finally, he understood the heart of the Christmas message. God has become one of us in Jesus. The eternal creator God has entered time and space as a baby, to show us who God is and how we can know Him.


Help us, in thankfulness and love, to share Your Christmas Light and Hope and Joy. Hallelujah! In Jesus' name.

On the importance of NOT keeping accurate minutes

Since you were the one to ask this parishioner of yours to act as PCC secretary, you have no reason to complain about the minutes of meetings she produces. You should never let anyone act as a secretary unless they cannot speak English or are hard of hearing, and preferably, both. The significant more the committee and the more contentious the issues being debated, the more you should nobly put yourself forward both to chair the meeting and take the minutes. 
will have long forgotten what actually did happen two months previously, and that many will not have had the time to read them anyway and will avoid having to admit that fact by passing them.

Further challenges will rally the rest of the committee to your side, and soon someone will suggest you proceed to the next item on the agenda. Since you are also the chairman, you naturally bow to their request.

Just in the way that church rotas bear no resemblance to the people who actually turn up to do the jobs, minutes of meetings need not bear too much resemblance to what actually happened, especially if what did happen is inconvenient for you.

After all, democracy is all very well - provided a benign dictator is in overall control.
