

Pastoral Letter . . .

Dear friends,

January can sometimes be a slow month and by the time you read this, it will be well and truly over. Yet, before we look towards the promise of spring and turn our thoughts to Lent and Easter (and next Christmas!), I want to take a moment to think about what has already happened; in particular, the 'Big Knit-In' that took place in St Mary's on 22nd January. Some 70 people came into the sanctuary, from within the church and beyond the walls, to knit or sew squares, as part of Glasgow Presbytery's Big Knit project in connection with Lodging House Mission to celebrate Glasgow 850, showing care and compassion by making blankets for homeless people in the city. It was a fruitful day, with plenty of knitting and chatting, tea and coffee and even some lovely soup; with the bonus of some background music played on the piano. There was a real buzz about the place and was enjoyed by all who came along. It led me to find out if the word 'knit' appeared in the bible. To my delight, it does, a few times, mostly in Leviticus in relation to fabric. It also appears though, in some translations of Paul's letter to the people in Colossae. In the New Living Translation, at chapter 2, verse 2 it says this: "I want them to be encouraged and knit together by strong ties of love," before Paul goes on to remind the people that Jesus is the centre of it all.

At the start of a new year, it does us no harm to think about our purpose and calling as a church, and Paul's words are both a comfort and a call to remember that in faith we are tied, bound, knit together by love. What a joy it is to know God's love for us, and for that love to bind us together, and then overflow into our love for each other and our neighbour. The 'Big Knit-In' was a wonderful example of people connecting and coming together, serving and offering their gifts, for a bigger purpose. It was great!

This year, I want to encourage us as a church to take opportunities and make opportunities to deepen our connections. Might it be time to stay for a coffee after the service or come along to the Lent Cluster study that will be starting on Wednesday 5th March? Maybe it's been a while since you worshipped in the sanctuary on a Sunday – what would help bring you back? Why not come along to Wednesday Welcome for a cuppa and blether first? Are you looking for a new hobby, or some company? Then remember there's the Craft Group that meet on a Monday afternoon. Perhaps you want to get a bit fitter, then there's badminton, Scottish Country Dancing and the Running Club. Maybe you can't get to church anymore and though you watch on YouTube, you would like a conversation - maybe it's time to give me a call and arrange a visit and home Communion? Or possibly you are reading this and have an idea for how we can be deepening our connections with one another, with our community, with our fellow Christians, and yes, with our God. If that's you – then please speak up. I would be happy to hear from you because connections are so important, and I want us to be a place where names, as well as faces are known. Where stories are heard and treasured. Where faith is grown and nurtured, and lives changed for the better through our love for one another and knowing God's love for us.

I want us to be encouraged and knit together by strong ties of love like never before ... what opportunities will you take to make that so?



If you would like to help, then please hand in your squares (size 4mm needles with 30 stitches and knit until it forms a square) up until the end of February. We hope to finish sewing up the blankets to forward to Glasgow Presbytery by the end of March. Each of our blankets uses ninety-six squares and has a heart knitted into each one. Blankets from around the churches are going to be displayed before being passed to Lodging House Mission. Thanks to everyone who helped on the day by stewarding, baking, making soup and providing hospitality to our guests. Thanks also to everyone who came along on the day to knit, eat and chat!

Reflecting Faith: Church Buildings

We have been thinking about different aspects of church buildings. But what about ‘the whole thing’? – the impression you have when you first see a church building?

Most of us have visited many church buildings, either to worship or as a tourist: to enjoy the splendour, the colours, the style and the architecture, with or without necessarily a time of prayer or worship.

There are some amazingly staggering designs around the world – one only has to think of the complex and intricate stone carving of Gaudi’s catholic basilica in Barcelona, Spain (due to be completed next year!) and then compare that to the sleekness of the Lutheran (Church of Iceland) parish church in Reykjavik, Iceland.

How about the grandeur of St Peter’s in Rome, full of baroque gold and rich colours? Or what about St Basil’s Cathedral in Red Square, Moscow – now a museum, but topped with amazingly coloured onion domes?

Just looking at the outside of a building tells you a lot about what it is likely to be like inside, the purpose of the building and the style of worship to expect there.

It’s not just about the condition of the fabric, or the tidiness of the grounds but rather the architecture itself.

When we see a contemporary modern building, we will expect the worship to match it: whether that is Protestant, Catholic or any other denomination.

The very first Valentine card, a legend

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home with their wives, instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage.

A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but who couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison awaiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14th February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.'

So, the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers

You can count on me

"Where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them." (Matthew 18:19-21)

I cannot count in church. I do not know why, but I cannot.

I mean that, when I am at the front and leading a service, I try to add up how many people there are in the congregation. We are supposed to do this and enter the figures in the church register, but I find it difficult. I usually give up and hope a warden has counted them. Do you include the leader and the organist? Well, yes, to increase the figures!

I am not sure why counting in church is a problem, as people do not move around. Yes, it is sometimes difficult to see heads in pews, but it should be easy. I start on one side and go to the back and then up the other side but then I get lost and have to start again. Sometimes the congregation see me looking from one to another and nodding gently to myself.

Numbers are important of course, but I am in two minds. Sometimes there are only a few and I think the pressure is off me, but it is disappointing, working hard to prepare a service and then not have many there. Often it seems that the congregation try a trick on me - and wait until the very last minute to rush in!

Numbers are important, but the most important figures are two and three. The most important relationships are between partners or a child and their parents. There is the same idea in the Bible.

I always like to pause between saying out loud the words two and three, which is good because I can just about count up to three!

What is the lectionary?


It is a set of readings from Scripture. The association of texts with specific days began in the 4th century. It is a set of readings for every day, and in particular for every Sunday, running over a three-year cycle (A, B and C). Each yearly cycle begins on the first Sunday of Advent. Year A follows year B, year C follows year B, then back again to A. The year which begins with Advent 2024 and ends at Advent 2025 is Year C

The lectionary sets out four readings for each Sunday: An Old Testament passage; a Psalm (or other Bible song); a New Testament reading; and a Gospel reading (Matthew, Mark or Luke - John is spread over all the years).

The year which begins with Advent 2024 and ends at Advent 2025 is Year C.

We are currently on Year C – Epiphany – Revised Common Lectionary. More information can be found here:


I was interested to hear that he was a church musician. Wanting to know if he sang tenor or bass, or even played the organ, he told me that he was the drummer in the worship band and provided backing vocals. I felt obliged to comment that I was not sure how that would fit in with Mattins, but he told me that he had never heard of that Service, and only attended Mega Rock Praise. Since I suspected it would not

have been written by Cranmer, we moved on.

I had hoped we may have been on safer ground when I asked him whether he preferred early perpendicular or Victorian gothic, but as he had apparently only ever worshipped in your converted cinema, he was unable to offer any opinion. His reaction to my offer to show him round our late Norman church, prompted him to tell me that he believed all churches should be closed and people should gather in each other's homes, like the early Christians.

In a last despairing attempt to find common ground I asked him if he had ever preached. He was slightly apologetic to admit that he had done so very rarely, as he found it took such a long time to write an hour-long sermon. When I mentioned that I did not think I had ever exceeded eight minutes in my entire life, he gave me such a look of withering astonishment that with heroic Christian charity, I did not beat him over the head with the Bible he was carrying.
