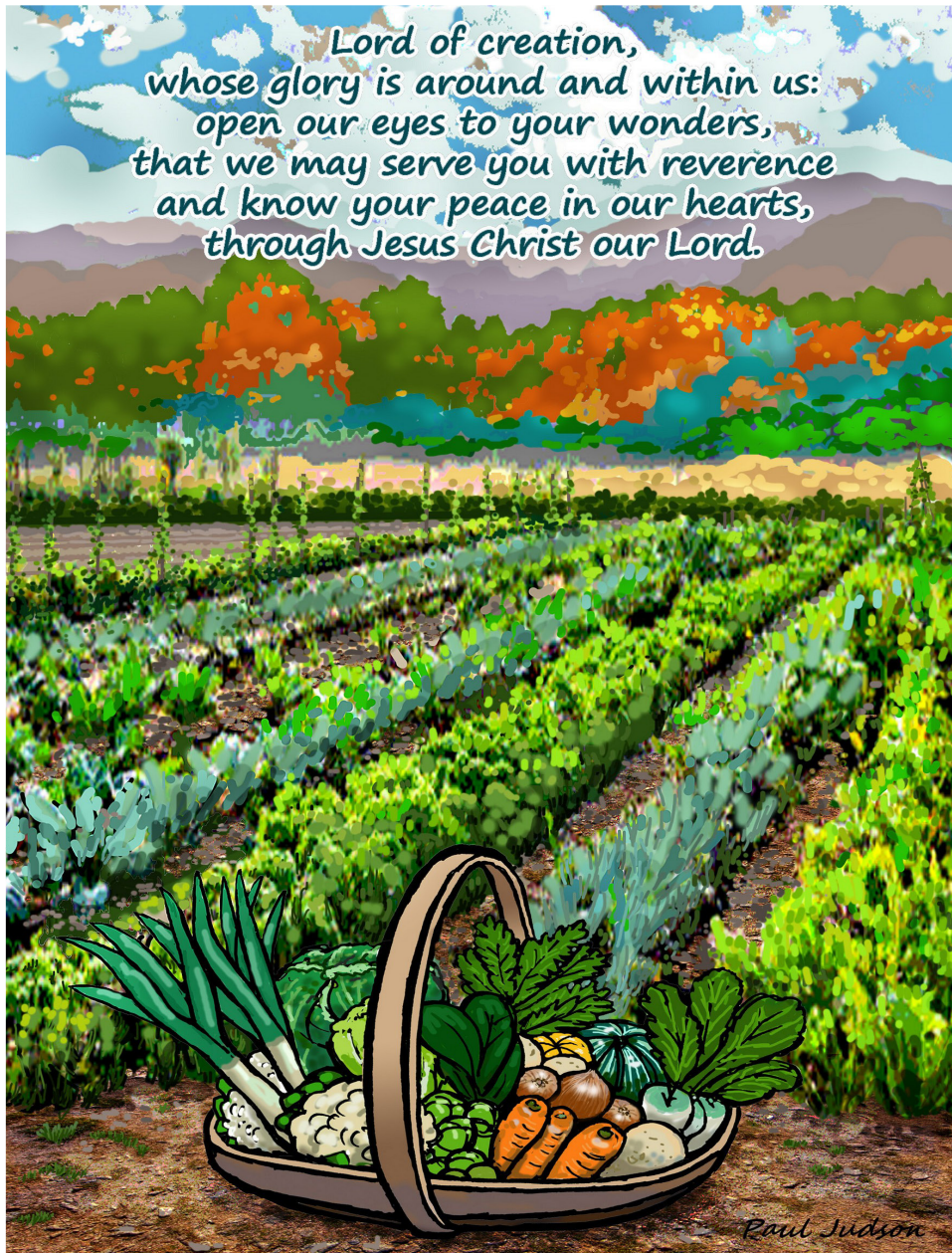

# Pastoral Letter ...

*Dear Friends,*

Although summer tends to be a quieter time, as I sit down to write this letter and think ahead to the coming months, I'm conscious of just how busy it has been for so many in our church! There was the Deep-Sea Divers cluster holiday club in Kirkintilloch and Lenzie where 30-40 children were welcomed over 4 days to hear stories about Jesus and enjoy crafts and games. There was the wonderful Big Kirkintilloch Weekend, where we welcomed many through the doors of St Mary's sanctuary. People enjoyed looking around and appreciated a moment of quiet amidst the noise of the Cowgate. Many families were also welcomed through the gates and thoroughly enjoyed potted sports and refreshments on the Saturday and Sunday afternoon brought the return of teddy bears in parachutes and crafts – what a joy! There was the knitting of lots and lots of beautiful flowers over many weeks and the time-consuming job of stitching them all on to a banner. This resulted in a stunning display on our railings, that brought colour and a timely message about the everlasting nature of God's Word to our high street: The grass withers and the flowers fall but the word of our God endures forever (Isaiah 40.8). Then, just last week, there was a delicious afternoon tea organised for the parents and carers of our nursery children, an opportunity for them to enjoy a blether and a warm cup of tea. All in all, it's been a very busy and good summer in St Mary's,

with opportunities to connect with our parish, share God's love, show something of His grace, and work with other congregations and one another. What a lot of work! What a committed and faithful bunch! What a team! Well done!

The work, as ever, continues, and the opportunities to participate and be part of the life of St Mary's is open to all. In the coming weeks there will be the resumption of lots of activities, including our regular monthly Open Doors, Wednesday Welcome with a short act of worship (10-12pm starting on 9th September), the Monday Craft Group (2-4pm) and the beginning of a new type of service called Soul Sanctuary. This will begin on Wednesday 3rd September, 7-8.30pm and will begin with some refreshments, followed by a short 30-40 minute service that will include times of silence, music, word and action. This will vary from week to week, drawing on the likes of the Iona Community Quiet Service, the practice of Lectio Divina and Ignatian Spirituality and will offer an opportunity to pause, breathe and be with the tag line: no pressure, just presence. All are welcome to come along. We are also exploring the possibility of starting house groups and having received a couple of requests for adult baptism in recent days, anyone who is not baptised or a member and is interested in exploring faith and what it means to follow Jesus and be part of the church, is welcome to join that conversation and see where it leads. Last, but by no means least, the work of the Trinity Mission Group has continued over the summer as we look towards our union, and we have been thinking about wellbeing and how that might be renewed in our parish. All in all, as we head into the autumn, there is much going on and I hope that you will be part of it. Either by continuing in your faithfulness and prayers, returning to us if you've been away (I can assure you of a warm welcome), or maybe coming along for the first time.

Come and be part of what God is doing in this time and this place – there is much to be involved in, there is much to look forward to.

# Nursery Update

The Nursery started the new session with staff undertaking training by Alison Sharp called 'Igniting Curiosity' This was a thought-provoking day that was enjoyed by all.

Some staff are currently working through Education Scotland online training. These five modules are based on the theme 'Keeping Trauma in Mind'.

The nursery currently has forty-five 3-5 year olds and sixteen 2 year olds; very healthy numbers for this time in the session. Those children returning to the nursery quickly settled back into the routine and our new starts have also settled in well.

There have been some visits from our recent nursery leavers who came to show staff how smart they are in their school uniforms! They too have settled well into the routine of school.

This year we held an Afternoon Tea for the parent/carers of our nursery children. This was held in the sanctuary and was enjoyed by all who attended. My thanks to everyone who helped make this a success.

Due to the spell of good weather our children have enjoyed visits to the local park. As well as enjoying time together on a grassy surface, these visits also provide opportunities to see changes in nature.

Ruth continues to visit the nursery each Wednesday getting to know the children and spending time with staff.

## Session Report

I hope you have all enjoyed a restful period over the summer months- and this year it has certainly felt like summer, with plenty of sunshine!

At the time of writing this report, September is fast approaching, which is when lots of activity starts for the new Session (including our Session Meetings).

However, this summer has been a particularly busy time for many folks in and around the Church. A couple of things in particular to note:

**The Fabric Team** always take the opportunity over the summer, when the nursery is on holiday, to carry out maintenance activities in the hall and the sanctuary. This year has been particularly productive and my thanks go to David Tinto and his team of willing volunteers for all their hard work. Some of the highlights:

- Enough "clearing out" to fill a large skip (& more!)
- Painting in the back corridor of the Church
- New door & windows on the Catherine Street side of the halls
- Electrical upgrades & improvements in the Sanctuary

**Holiday Club.** This year, the Cluster Holiday Club (Deep Sea Divers) ran in our halls for the first two days and moved to Lenzie Old for the last two. Considerable effort is dedicated to the planning and coordination of this event, in addition to the work required to effectively manage each of the four days. My thanks for the time and talents of everyone involved - I know the Holiday Club was thoroughly enjoyed by all the children who came along.

**Kirkintilloch Big Weekend.** Instead of the canal festival this year, Kirkintilloch Bid organised the "Kirkintilloch Big Weekend". It was wonderful to see the Church involved in this significant community event:

- Church open all day on the Saturday, with teas and coffee being served;
- Back to School Potted Sports on the Saturday afternoon – over 130 children taking part;
- Church open on the Sunday afternoon, crafts, tea room & more.

One of the highlights must be the spectacle of teddy bears & other assorted soft toys parachuting from the Church tower – a real crowd pleaser!

Again, my thanks to everyone involved in making this such a successful weekend.

Just a quick update on a couple of topics:

### **Basis of Union**

As anticipated, Glasgow Presbytery have appointed a "Scheme of Delegation" to undertake a review of the buildings currently used by St Mary's and St. David's Memorial Park. This review has started, although there has not been significant progress over the summer months. We have provided the committee with some initial information in regard to St Mary's and it is anticipated that in the coming weeks, further meetings and site visits will be arranged. This process is likely to take several months to complete – we will keep you updated as the work proceeds.

### **Contact Details**

Thank you to everyone who has already sent me their contact details. This is helping us to build our register of members and adherents and for the first time, collate a more comprehensive list of telephone numbers and email addresses. The intimation regarding contact details has been included in the magazine this month, so if you have not had the opportunity to do it already, I would encourage you to take the time to share your details with me. Thank you.

### **Harvest**

Our harvest celebrations will be taking place next month and, as always, your harvest donations will support Lodging House Mission, East Dunbartonshire Foodbank and St Rollox Community Outreach Project. Lodging House Mission has provided an updated list of their most needed items, noting that several essential supplies are currently out of stock. Their list appears in this month's magazine to maximise the effectiveness of our harvest donations. 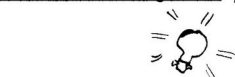

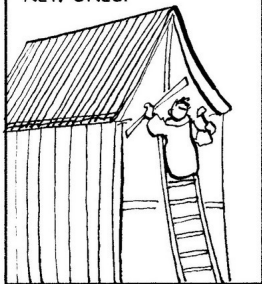

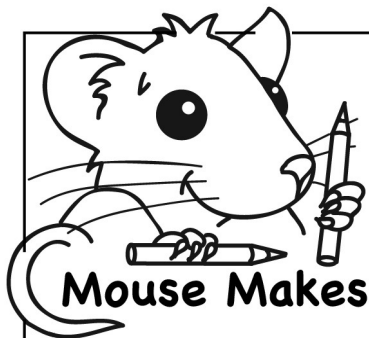

## Ninian, Bishop of Galloway – Apostle of the Picts (Scotland)

---

Ninian was a Celt who was born about 360, in southern Scotland. He was remarkable for two things: he was almost certainly the first man in Scotland to live in a little white stone house, and also the first to preach the gospel to the Scots. Just as remarkable: becoming the apostle to the Picts was intimately connected to him even having a white-washed stone house, instead of the usual wooden hovel.

For Ninian had not always stayed in Scotland, but had travelled to Rome to study, and then on to Gaul, where he had spent time with St Martin of Tours. Martin's monastery was called Loco Teiac (little white house), and it seems that when Ninian returned to Scotland to preach the gospel, he wanted something similar. And so it was that Ninian built his little white house, called Ad Candidam Casam, and began sharing the Gospel with the Picts who lived in Whithorn and Galloway. This was the region north of the old Roman wall – where Roman rule had never been established.

Ninian seems to have been very effective, for it is said that, like Patrick (a generation later) and Columba (a century and a half later), he helped form the character of Celtic Christianity. And throughout southern Scotland, there are still many churches who bear his name.

## No men

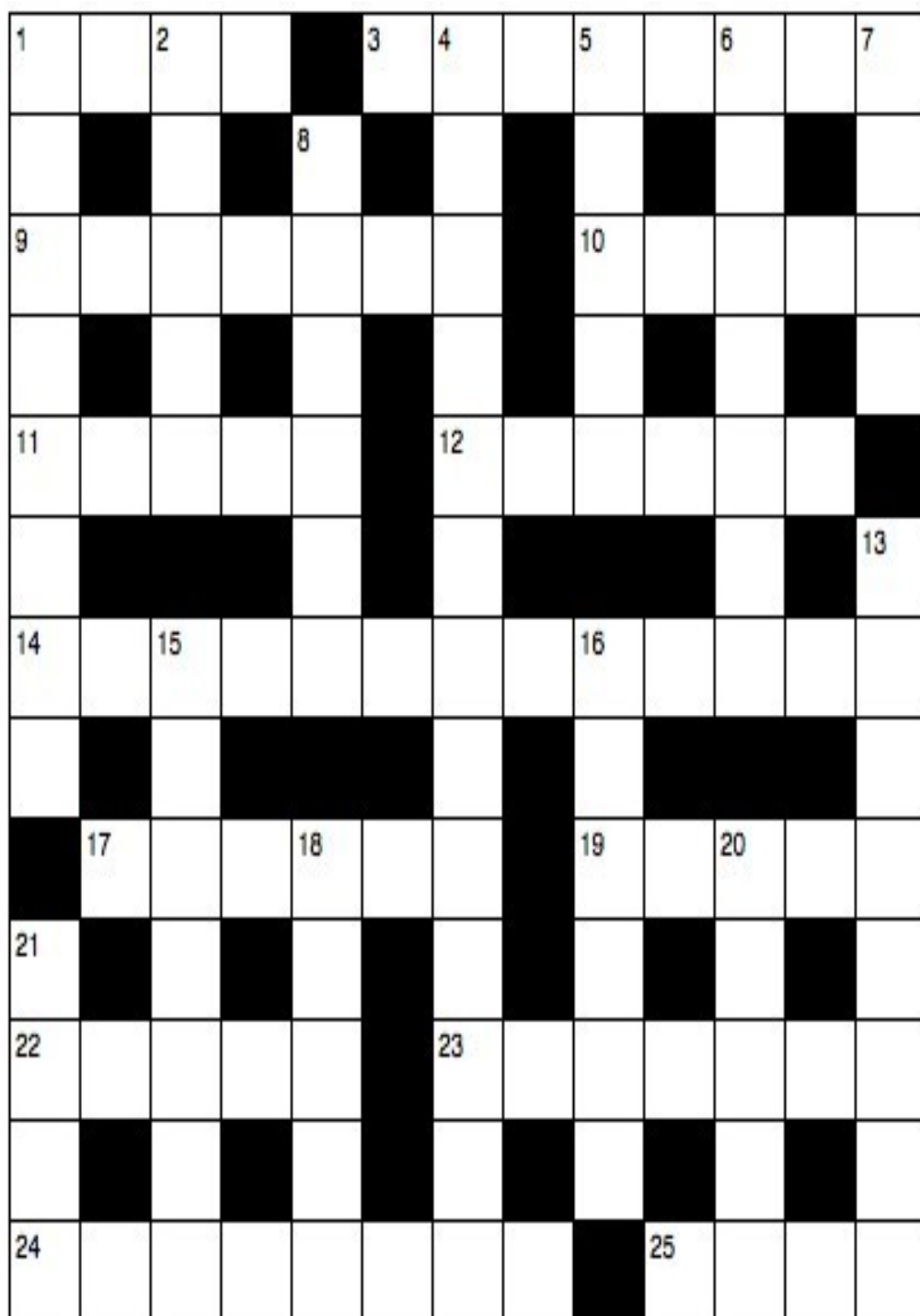
